**Singular and Fatal Accident.**—From a private letter received by us, we learn that at a village (the name of which is not given by our correspondent), in Michigan, recently, Mrs. Louisa Fisk, formerly Miss Louisa Price, of Titusville, Crawford Co., Pa., fell from a swing and broke her neck, back, and both limbs, from which injuries she died soon after. She had been married but six weeks, and was about 19 years of age.

The weather here during the past two weeks has been very cold, and to-day (Wednesday) we have fires to make our office comfortable to work in. Last Wednesday night (7th) portions of our county were visited by a heavy frost, which injured the buckwheat and corn crops to a considerable extent, in some portions wholly destroying the former. In other localities the frost did scarcely any injury. In some village gardens we noticed that potato vines were completely withered, while in others they were only slightly injured.

We neglected to notice last week that the McKean Citizen has just commenced its sixth volume, and in doing so has increased its size somewhat, and run up a new and beautiful heading, and our very young friend, W. A. Nichols, has accepted the post of local editor. The Citizen is one of our best exchanges, and is one of the line of "North tier" Republican papers which are so true to their party's principles. All we hear from them now, is, "Black Republican" or "unconstitutional"; as it stands from their new quarters. The Journal has done much good work. It has assisted immensely in the "spread healthy reform," and the Republican party of Potter county is indebted to the Journal more than to any other cause, for their present prosperity. Of course, the Republicans of this county could not so ungratefully as not to give to the Journal their warm and hearty support.

We presume that the numerous friends of the Coudersport Academy will be gratified to learn that the present and last year of the fourth year of its existence under the superintendence of the Rev. J. H. Hendrick, is one of the most flourishing, not only in regard to numbers, but regard to the character of the students' attendance; and so many "old familiar faces" must give gladness to the heart of a Principal, beyond even the fullness of the school.

When Mr. Hendrick, four years since, accepted the position of Principal, dark clouds, "big with doubt" and distrust, hung over the Institution, threatening its usefulness and even its existence. Discouragements hemmed it in on all sides, and many of its warm friends stood, fearing, doubting and trembling; and although his first term manifested his "power" for the place, it was not till several terms had passed, that its friends felt secure. But his energy and determination—his fitness for the place overcame all obstacles that lay in the way; and created confidence which has gone on increasing from that time until now, when, reaching out in its strength, it is able to enter the lists for the prize against Institutions of a similar kind which have become more richly endowed.

We have had several students here who had previously been instructed at Oberlin and Alfred; also some from other schools of the State of New York, all of whom have done us the honor to say, that they had found no better teacher in any of these institutions; than ours—proving to

all observers, that "it is the man who wins." And though he will retire from this field of labor without having made himself rich in this world's goods, he will have earned "the sweet reward of duty done."

Mr. H. is well able to understand the disadvantages attendant upon the limited means of many young persons in this new country, who are anxiously endeavoring to obtain an education—not having been "reared in the lap of luxury"—but like many others, whose successes in early as well as later life, have depended upon their own exertions, he is well qualified, through his past experience, to speak the word of friendly sympathy and encouragement to those, whose lot it is to contend with difficulties,—"having drunk of the cup of which they drink"—his consolatory and strengthening words are fraught with benefits to them which will be invaluable now and henceforth.

It is a great satisfaction to parents to feel that their children have been entrusted to the care of a teacher, whose daily life is an impressive lesson of the good results of early habits of industry and perseverance. In him they have an example of what one man, with a will and energy to hold fast that which is good, may do for himself and others.

Not only as a teacher, but as a citizen, has his influence been for the "good of this people," and we feel sure that on his retirement from the position he has so long and faithfully held, the best wishes of all with whom he is acquainted will accompany him.

Mr. Hendrick will remain with us and devote his entire energies, during the coming winter, to the duties of his office as County Superintendent—to which, in some future number, we intend to call the attention of the friends of education in this county; and we will also take occasion to say a few words as to the necessity and importance of our citizens taking steps for erecting a new building for academic purposes in this place. We trust that in the meantime our citizens will talk the matter over.
