## ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

PURSUANT to an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act relating to the elections of this Commonwealth," approved the second day of July, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine; I, A. C. TAGGART, Sheriff of the county of Potter, Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the county aforesaid, that a General Election will be held in the said county of Potter on the Second Tuesday (11th) of October, 1859, at which time State and County Officers as follows are to be elected, to wit:

- One person for Auditor General of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania;
- One person for Surveyor General of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania;
- One person for State Senator, to represent the XIIIth District, comprising the counties of Tioga, Potter, McKean and Warren;
- Two persons for Members of the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, in conjunction with the county of Tioga, to represent the counties of Tioga and Potter;
- One person for District Attorney for the county of Potter;
- One person for Sheriff of the county of Potter;
- One person for Coroner of the county of Potter;
- One person for Commissioner of the county of Potter;
- One person for Auditor of the county of Potter;
- One person for Surveyor of the county of Potter.

I also make known and give notice, as in and by the 13th section of the aforesaid act in aid directed, that every person, excepting Justices of the Peace, who holds any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States or of this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is or shall be employed under the legislative, judiciary, or executive department of this State or of the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select and common council of any city, or commissioner of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector, or clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector or Judge, or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office then to be voted for.

It is further directed that the meeting of the return judges at the Court House in Coudersport to make out the general returns, shall be on the first Friday succeeding the general election, which will be the 14th day of October.

The return judges of the counties of Tioga, Potter, McKean and Warren, comprising the 11th Senatorial district will meet at the Court House in the Borough of Coudersport, on the 18th day of October next, to make out an official return for member of the Senate.

The return judges of Potter and Tioga counties shall meet at the Court House in the Borough of Wellsboro, in the county of Tioga, on Tuesday, the 18th day of October, 1859, to make return for Members of Assembly.

I also hereby make known and give notice that the places for holding the aforesaid general election in the several townships and boroughs within the county of Potter, are as follows, to wit: For the township of Abbott, at the house formerly occupied by T.
