A man giving his name as James Carl was arrested in this village on Tuesday evening last, on suspicion of having stolen goods in his possession—he having about \$250 worth, of which he was unwilling or unable to give any satisfactory account, and answering all questions very incoherently. He was examined before Justice Cushing on Tuesday evening and Wednesday morning, when he was committed to jail for further hearing on Saturday at 2 o'clock. The goods are dress silks, silk handkerchiefs, linen and cotton handkerchiefs, buttons, suspenders, thread, needles, cutlery, vests and pantaloons, and two powder flasks—one a brass-mounted horn flask, marked nine shillings. Part of the goods had a different color mark on them from the others. He disclaimed being a pedlar, and when asked where he lived, said he had no residence, and had come from Clearfield up the West Branch, Kettle and Pine Creeks, and was going to Olean.

Mr. Housler was not drunk at the time, and the consequences of this accident can in no way be attributed to his intoxication. Meeting of the Ulysses Republican Club.
OLYSSSES, Jan. 7th 1860.
MR. EDITOR.—Our Republican Club held its first regular monthly meeting on the evening of the 5th inst., in the Academy, with the expectation of hearing a speech from Mr. Olmsted or Mr. Mann; but were for some (probably good) reason disappointed. After waiting a reasonable time, the President stated that we had not called the meeting under a false pretense, but had good reason for expecting a speaker; and as the audience, to the number of 200, had come expecting a speech, he called on Mr. Seth Lewis, who responded by reading from the *Semi-Weekly Tribune* an article on "Helper's Impending Crisis," and by a speech which, for clearness, would not suffer by comparison with any published speech that I have read since the organization of the present Republican party. The President also said he understood that there had been some music prepared for the occasion, and which he called for. Some of the students of the Academy, under the leadership of Mr. Seth Lewis, executed "The Great F. F. of Old Virginia," with two verses added in relation to the John Brown affair, which was very appropriate, and which alluded to "200 men keeping 17 men at bay." The President being called for made a short speech stating that we were called agitators, and showing from history that we were not guilty of starting the agitation. That it grew out of the removal of the Missouri compromise line, the fugitive slave law, and a few other late acts of the party in power. It is understood that the regular meetings of the Club are to be at Lewisville, and special meetings, if any, in other parts of the town. ONE OF 'EM.
