The President's Celebrated Letter to Gov. Walker. Below we give the celebrated letter written by Mr. Buchanan to the Hon. Robert J. Walker, when the latter was Governor of Kansas.

WASHINGTON, July 12, 1857. MY DEAR SIR—I duly received your letter of the 28th ult. on Friday last, and read it to the Cabinet then in session. The views which it contained were not calculated to assure us of your success, though we did not despair. Hence you may judge with what satisfaction we received an account of the proceedings of the National Democratic Convention, held at Leominster on the 3d inst.

In regard to Georgia, our news from that State is becoming better every day. We have not yet had time to hear much from Mississippi. Should you answer the resolution of the latter, I would advise you to make the great principle of the submission of the Constitution to the bona fide residents of Kansas conspicuously prominent.

Col. Gunning has been appointed Governor of Utah. This will cause his place to be vacant after the brief period required for settling up his business, and I certainly shall be disposed to fill it by the appointment of Mr. Stevens.

Kansas is vastly more important at the present moment than Utah. The pressure upon me continues without intermission. I pray that Divine Providence, in which I place my trust, may graciously preserve my life and my health until the end of my term. But God's will be done, in any event.
