Our Farmers.
(CONTINUED.)

When I proposed a manure-tank, I did not intend to blame anybody of ill-management, nor to do me good by raising this question to the order of the day. We all should try to learn from one another and keep the best. Certainly as a German I am not used to see and comprehend a very often reckless and careless way as would as some of my "go-ahead" neighbors do; nay! I only can praise, what is worth praising and rejoice to see any man trying to get along, without owing one man a dollar.

A manure-tank can be easily made.—If you have not got any clay on your premises, may be a progress-loving neighbor has some to accommodate you with—to make four walls and a bottom about one foot thick and about 6 feet deep—length and width as you choose. That clay must be worked stiff without containing any lumps, and made up into walls by using boards to rub the surface smooth. Between now and August is the best time for making it. Keep up the manure in a square and leave a space on one end, where the liquids or liquor will gather, which you have to pour at least once a week over the heap. No soap-suds ought to come anywhere near here, your water-closet should stay here, if convenient, and your hog-pen, which would save you all your troubles ten times in a single year and you will have the profits many years to come. How much refuse straw of all kinds is wasted on farms that can be rendered profitable! On a farm, there should be no waste whatever. The beddings, droppings and liquids ought to be brought in a combination to forbid the use of "Mon-sieur Ammonia!" the blue air; no! to be confined into a nice and compact room to increase in fertilizing power and enrich your soil, and bring us ease, joy and wealth! Make my words, almost everybody is able to have one and let us hear and see next fall, who has the nicest, best and largest manure-tank, then, where there is plenty of manure in the ground, these are heaven's blessings unbought. I suppose, that a field manured in such a way would undoubtedly surpass your expectations, besides it must be understood, that a fair tilling of the soil is absolutely necessary. Corn ought to be soaked in nitre or coppers before planting to protect it against chipmunks, &c., and rolling in plaster would not be objectionable, or to spread two spoonful in the hill before planting. Oats and Wheat ought to be sated with about one bushel to the acre to prevent rust—a sure, cheap remedy. It is now the time to do it, if you are afraid that the previous weather will cause it. Be watchful and work as long as it is yet daylight, then night will come (or a better time) where no one can work any more; and too late for all wishes. Mark: Foresight is cheaper than after-sighs.
