COUDERSPORT, JULY 12, 1860.

Col. - We have had two or three colds during the last week - a great coat as comfortable out-doors, while a fire is necessary to comfort in-door. On Friday our compositors could not set type without a fire. The weather will no doubt continue cool till after the eclipse on the 13th.

A picnic was held on Ayres' Hill on the 4th of July, which was attended by the Brass Band and a number of our citizens. Those present from here report that it was a very pleasant and creditable affair. It was held under the auspices of the Ayres' Hill and Homer Sabbath schools.

Accident - On Friday last, Mr. Lemuel Sherman, of Pike township, was tilling his corn with a cultivator, having a belt hitched to it, when the belt became tightened by some horses playing in the road, and jumping forward, threw Mr. Sherman down on the shanks of the cultivator teeth, cutting his face badly, and nearly killing him. He was carried into his house insensible, but we learn that he was doing well on Saturday.

The Eclipse - A half eclipse of the sun will take place on Wednesday, the 13th inst., beginning at 7:10 in the morning and lasting two hours. The greatest obscuration is at 8:10. We have received very handsome colored diagrams of the eclipse and its line of travel, containing many valuable calculations and statistics of astronomy, from Prof. A. S. Smith, of New York, author of astronomical works. The diagram is very valuable, and will be sent to any one enclosing him a dime and three cent piece, addressed to him at Post-office, station E., 8th Avenue, New York. A comet is now visible in the northern sky in the evening. It is a large one, and will not visit the Earth again for 15-20 years hence; so all should take a look at it while they have a chance.

PROFANE SWEARING - It is not generally known that the Revised Penal Code, passed last winter makes all persons who speak loosely or profanely of God, Christ, the Holy Spirit, or the Bible, liable to an indictment for blasphemy, the penalty for which is a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding three months, or both, at the discretion of the court. Persons in the habit of swearing had better be careful, as no officer who regards his oath of office can aid returning to Court all persons who are guilty of the offence above specified.

PROBABLE MURDER - Thomas Mosier Bloomfield township, was committed to jail in this place, on last Thursday, charged with the murder of his wife. It is said that they were married but a few months and for some cause have twice separated during that time. Last week she came in Greenfield, Erie county, to see her father's in Bloomfield. He followed her there and endeavored to persuade her to go back with him - but without success. He remained overnight, and as he was leaving he discovered her at a window sewing. He picked up an axe at the wood-pile, and going to the back door entered the room where she was. She sprang upon a bed and endeavored to escape from him, but he knocked her down and inflicted several murderous wounds on her neck, face and head from which she can scarcely recover. The man who furnished the information said that "she was the most inhumanly shipped creature he ever saw, neither white nor colored."

WE learn that Governor Parker has appointed Russell Brown, Esq., of Warren, to fill the vacancy in this Judicial Circuit, created by the death of the Hon. John Galbraith. Mr. B. is a good lawyer and high-toned and honorable gentleman, and will doubtless discharge the duties of the place in a satisfactory manner during the short time he will be permitted to occupy it. - Erie Gazette.
