We notice the familiar face of Rev. L. F. PORTER, again upon our streets. He resides in Monroe county, N. Y., at present. We are requested to give notice that he will address the Republicans of Oswayo, at Oswayo village on Monday evening next, and on Tuesday evening he will preach at that place. On the Wednesday evening following he will preach at Sharon Center.

The Weather.—MONDAY—Rain nearly all Sunday night and nearly all day Monday. Grew cold towards night, and TUESDAY—we have a good time shivering in our thick clothes by a comfortable fire. Ugh! The clouds are breaking up, however, and there is a prospect of a change "for better or for worse." A few days last week were warm enough in all conscience.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, we have to build fire again. This is pleasant for August, but it is very natural weather so near the clouds.

We are in receipt of a copy of the "List of Premiums and Regulations of the Pennsylvania State Agricultural Society, at its 7th annual exhibition to be held at the Wyoming Battle Ground, (near Wilkes-Barre), on the 25th, 26th, 27th and 23th of September." The pamphlet is very handsomely printed, having a cheap appearance entirely unworthy of the subject matter. It bears no imprint, but is evidently from one of the Wyoming Valley printing offices.

Among the Committee upon "Fanning Mills, Separators, Threshing Machines, Hay, Straw, Stalk and Vegetable Cutters," we find the name of our fellow-citizen, Lewis Mann, Esq.

Berries.—The Potter County (Pa.) Journal has some berry items that are worth mentioning. It says that 75 bushels of black raspberries have been gathered this year within one mile of the Court House. People there estimate that a million bushels of berries of all kinds will be gathered in that County this season. These at 5 cents a quart would make over \$1,000,000.—*Jamestown Journal*.

We didn't say that a million bushels will be gathered in this county—we said it would be a safe estimate of the growth. Perhaps a thousand bushels ripen and go to the ground to rot, where ten bushels are picked and used; and this would be a picked crop of 10,000 bushels; only claimed 4,000, which is a fair estimate.

This gives us an opportunity to correct a mistake of over half a million dollars made by the compositor in setting up the word "million" in the article above. A million bushels of berries at 5 cents a quart, would amount to one million six hundred thousand dollars, instead of \$1,000,000. On taking a short tramp through the woods oneself last week, we concluded the above estimate was perfectly correct. We picked eight quarts in about two hours, on Saturday—partly raspberries and partly black berries.

By request we re-publish the list of members of the County Agricultural Society, together with the Committee of Management. A copy of this list will be furnished to each officer, and each member, as the representative of the Society in his township, is earnestly solicited to make every possible effort to secure a complete exhibition.

The ULYSSES ACADEMY was commenced in the spring of 1859 and opened to students the following September. Its object is to afford to the youth of its vicinity, and to others who may choose it, as a place of study, the requisite facilities for obtaining a thorough and practical education.
