Additional Improvements.—We notice some building improvements overlooked by us week before last.

D. F. Glassmire has purchased the building occupied by J. B. Smith as a store, and has fitted up several very nice bed rooms in the second story, enabling him to accommodate a great many more than heretofore. He has also added stabling and sheds to his barn to the amount of about \$600.

G. C. Manley and John Reckhow have fitted up a commodious Wagon-Shop, opposite Manley's Blacksmith Shop.

Several of our citizens have built kitchen additions to their dwellings and some six or eight fine barns have been built or are in the course of erection.
