Taken for true, that there is nothing perfect in this world—that neither men nor laws, religious nor political views, social nor legislative opinions, actions and transactions are in the right or wrong path, this can only be approved or disapproved by an impartial author, who, far from self-love, money-seeking, honor-seeking, office-seeking, favor-seeking &c., is willing to bring the people to a clear understanding of the every-day life in this present day.

I have become your fellow-citizen, because I love this country. I love its people. Man needs education, and education makes the man. To educate a child, it wants a loving teacher, and to make it successful, a child that loves his teacher. Fear should be unknown.

Since that time, six years have passed. Knowing and understanding English a little better, I thought it time to unlock the chamber of my impressions, and give a just account of my views. The foundation of all actions, of all life is laid down into the hearts of a nation, and this cornerstone is called Religion!

There are only a very few Christians to be found, if any—although we live in a Christian country. It is too generally the case, that men will think themselves better than they are indeed. It is not said too much, that laymen and even Clergymen are seeking that blessed Kingdom of Heaven, but are holding with all their might on the things of the earth, forgetting the desire to reach the former.
