**ATTEMPTED MURDER AND SUICIDE.**  
On Friday last, JOHN RICE attempted to murder his wife, in the Sugar Valley town, near FURST'S Saw Mill. The man states that he knocked her down, and jumped upon her, and then, drawing her to be dead, dragged her to the laurel. When found she was covered with blood and nearly senseless. She is slowly recovering, and her wounds supposed not to be fatal.

On Saturday Rice was brought to Jail. Yesterday evening committed suicide by disemboweling himself, cutting a long groove across the abdomen, tearing out his liver, and then cutting off some of the arteries. —Clinton Democrat.

**STOP THE MURDERERS.**—Eight hundred dollars reward.—On Sunday, the 17th inst., the house of Thomas Stewart, in Liberty township, Clarion county, Pa., entered and about eighty dollars stolen. The same night, about twelve o'clock, Jared Lewis and Eli McCall entered the persons suspected of being robbers. One of them drew a revolver and fired, instantly killing Mr. Lewis and wounding McCall. One of the fellows who calls himself Charley Logue, is six feet high, has a mole on the face, florid complexion, brown hair, dark nose, and was shaved closely; wore dark clothing, with boots over his shoulders. The other is of a sandy complexion, about five feet eight or nine inches high, and wore a moustache of a bright red and had on a light brown colored coat. The above reward will be paid for the delivery of the above persons in the County of Clarion county, or two hundred and fifty for either of them. [Signed by C. Swarth, B. **SECTIONALISM.**—Mr. Breckenridge is nominated by a "sectional" Convention. It was almost exclusively Southern, there being but a handful of northern delegates present in it. Yet Mr. Breckenridge denies that he is a "sectional" candidate, and meets the charge as follows: "That is the platform and these are the principles avowed. If they are sectional they are not sectional, for the Constitution is broad enough to cover the whole Union.

Who stands upon the Constitution neither be sectional nor a disunionist. Very good doctrine, Mr. Breckenridge, and the Republican platform and party stand upon the Constitution," they cannot be "sectional." We accept the logic and hope we shall hear no more from the Breckenridgers about the "sectionalism" and "disunionism" of the Republicans. —Savannah Gazette.

**Forty-Six New Recruits.**—The French population, like patriotic men, are coming over to the Republicans by tens. **A ROMORED POLITICAL BARGAIN.**  
The Philadelphia Evening Bulletin says that an arrangement was consummated a night or two ago, by which the Bell-Everett party in that city is to be sold out to the Democracy. The leaders of the Bellites, Douglasses and Breckenridgers held a meeting and perfected the terms of the sale. They are as follows:—The Bell and Everett city ticket is to be supported, both branches of the Democracy dropping their candidates to that end. Mr. Brodhead, the Democratic candidate for Congress in the Second District, is to be slaughtered, and Henry M. Fuller, the Bell and Everett candidate for the same position, is to be supported by the fusionists. In return for all this the Bell and Everetts are to support Gen. Foster for Governor, and also the regular Democratic nominees for Congress in the First, Third, Fourth and Fifth Districts. The Presidential question is to be left open until after the second Tuesday in October.

**PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 16, 1860.**—Resolutions were unanimously adopted at the Douglas meeting last night, denouncing the Cresson fusion, and ratifying the straight Douglas ticket. The meeting was large and enthusiastic at the close. Gov. Johnson will make a tour of the State during the week. He will commence at Lancaster on Monday next, and close at Pittsburgh on Saturday evening. THE Buffalo Express says: Abe Lincoln was always honest and always will be. Douglas never was honest, but he will be a non est man after the election. The Fond du Lac Press says there is not "a buggy load of Breckenridge men in the State." Perhaps not, but there will be a "sulky" load of Douglas men after the election.

PURSUANT to an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act relating to the election of this Commonwealth," approved the second day of July A. D. one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, I, Wm. F. Bart, Sheriff of the County of Potter, Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the County aforesaid that a General Election will be held in said County of Potter on **Tuesday**, the 21st day of November next, being the 21st day of November next, within the said County, to-wit: For the Township of Abbott, at the Germania Hotel, in said township.

The officers to be elected at the time and places aforesaid are twenty-seven persons as follows: President and Vice-President of the United States.

It is further directed that the meeting of the return judges at the Court House in Coudersport to make out the general returns, shall be on the first Friday succeeding the general election, which will be the 9th day of November.

I also make known and give notice as in and by the 13th section of the aforesaid Act I am directed, that every person except Justices of the Peace, who holds any office of appointment of profit or trust under the Government

of the United States or of any city or incorporated district, whether a Commissioner of any office or otherwise; a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the legislative, judicial, or executive department of this State or of the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select and common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or receiving at the same time the office of appointment of Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector or Judge, or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office then to be voted for.

Also, that in fourth section of the Act of Assembly entitled "an Act relating to elections and for other purposes," approved April 16th, 1840, it is enacted that the aforesaid 13th section shall not be so construed as to prevent any military officer or Borough officer from serving as Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any general or special election in this Commonwealth. Pursuant to the provisions of the 1st section of said act, every general and special election shall be opened between the hours of 8 and 10 in the forenoon; and shall continue without interruption or adjournment until 7 o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed.
