

**Picking a Mandrake Apple.**  
The Philadelphia *North American* gives the following local, in a recent number:

Among the handsome villas that ornament the vicinity of Chestnut Hill is a notable water-cure establishment, where health, longevity and digestion equal to that of a threshing machine are imparted through the medium of douches, wet packing, and a style of bolognas made from farina and cracked wheat. Among the guests at the establishment—of whom very many board at the water-cure for the sake of its beautiful surroundings rather than its hydraulics—is a gentleman whom we will call Colonel Blank. Col. Blank is a votary of nature, and has a weakness for botany that takes him occasionally upon long walks by the fragrant hedgerows that ornament that beautiful locality. **Election Proclamation.**

PURSUANT to an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act relating to the elections of this Commonwealth," approved the second day of July, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, I, WM. F. BURT, Sheriff of the county of Potter, Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the county aforesaid, that a General Election will be held in the said county of Potter on the **Second Tuesday** (9th) of October, 1890, at which time State and County Officers as follows are to be elected, to wit:

- One person for Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- One person for Member of Congress to represent the District composed of the Counties of Centre, Clinton, Lycoming, Mifflin, Potter and Sullivan.
- Two persons for Members of the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, in conjunction with the county of Tioga, to represent the counties of Tioga and Potter.
- One person for Prothonotary and Clerk of the Courts of the County of Potter.
- One person for Register and Recorder of the County of Potter.
- One person for Coroner of the county of Potter.
- One person for Treasurer of the County of Potter.
- One person for Commissioner of the county of Potter.

I also make known and give notice, as in and by the 13th section of the aforesaid act I am directed, that every person, excepting Justices of the Peace, who holds any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States or of this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is or shall be employed under the legislative, judicial, or executive department of this State or the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select and common council of any city, or commissioner of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector, or clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector or Judge, or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office then to be voted for.

Also, that in the fourth section of the Act of Assembly, entitled "An Act relating to elections and for other purposes," approved April 16th, 1890, it is enacted that the aforesaid 13th section shall not be so construed as to prevent any military officer or Borough officer from serving as Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any general or special election in this Commonwealth.

It is further directed that the meeting of the return Judges at the Court House in Coudersport to make out the general returns, shall be on the first Friday succeeding the general election, which will be the 12th day of October.  
The return Judges of Potter and Tioga counties shall meet at the Court House in the Borough of Wellsboro, in the county of Tioga, on Tuesday, the 16th day of October, 1890, to make return for Members of Assembly.  
The return Judges of Lycoming, Centre, Clinton, Mifflin, Sullivan and Potter counties, shall meet at Williamsport, in the County of Lycoming, on Tuesday the 16th day of October, to make return for Member of Congress.
