CONDERSPORT, SEPTEMBER 27, 1860.

Farmer of Potter—are you aware that the County Fair takes place a week from Wednesday—the day after election. You should be getting ready for so important a matter. The Hon. A. B. Dickerson will certainly deliver the address.

The Academy was reopened last Monday for the Fall Term by Miss Stockwell, with Miss Rhoda Rathbone as Assistant. Both of these ladies are first-class teachers, and are both well known to our community. They are not only good teachers, but are genuine women, under whose charge parents may safely and confidently trust the moral and mental education of their children. The school opened on Monday with some 35 scholars, we believe, and the number is steadily increasing as we learn. The people of this village and vicinity cannot better show their appreciation of the cause of education than by sending their children to the Academy.

The Circus—a very poor affair, at best—visited this place last Saturday, and brought a large number of people and spectators—the last they had, or expected to have—to this place. Some old women came with dried berries and offered them for almost nothing to get money to go to the circus with—while many a man was seen with a quarter borrowed from a neighbor, while his family was likely to get their bread and victuals this winter principally from the berries they have picked and dried this fall. And we noticed also that a great many were here who owed us a smallittance of one or two dollars, who have never been able to raise it for us—so that they could readily raise enough to take themselves and a half-dozen children into the circus, afternoon and evening. The circus, taverns and stores made money Saturday.

Court was in session here last week, and a large number of people were here in attendance. The business of the Court was confined to criminal matters entirely until Saturday, when we believe one civil action—that of Byam vs. Jones, administrator of Lyman, dec'd—was put on trial in the afternoon and resulted in a verdict for the Plaintiff. Com. vs. James Bartron.—Selling liquor on Sunday. Verdict guilty.
Com. vs. Dennis McGinnis.—Assault and battery, convicted at June term.—Sentenced \$1 and costs, and stand committed.
Com. vs. Hezekiah S. Byles.—Ind't. Selling liquor without license. Verdict not guilty, and county to pay costs.
Com. vs. Silas Nelson.—Selling liquor without license. Verdict not guilty, but Deft. pay costs.
Com. (Mary Ann Jordan, prosecutrix) vs. Daniel Bartron.—Assault and battery with intent to commit a rape. Verdict not guilty, but Deft. and prosecutor each pay half the costs.
Com. vs. Henry Ervay.—Deft. plead guilty to stealing a yoke of oxen from Owen. Sentenced to Penitentiary at Philadelphia for three years.—The Sheriff left for Philadelphia with the prisoner on Monday.

General Election Proclamation.

PURSUANT to an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act relating to the election of this Commonwealth," approved the second day of July A. D. one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, I, Wm. F. Burt, Sheriff of the County of Potter, Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the County aforesaid that a General Election will be held in said County of Potter on Tuesday, the 6th day of November next, being the Tuesday next after the first Monday of said month, in the several districts within the said County, to-wit:

For the Township of Abolt, at the Germania Hotel, in said township.
For the township of Allegheny, at the school house near the place formerly owned by Chester Andrews, in said township.
For the township of Bingham, at the house of A. R. Lewis, in said township.
For the township of Clara, at the school house near Sala Stevens, in said township.
For the township of Eulalia, at the New Court House in the Borough of Condersport.
For the township of Genesee, at the house formerly occupied by S. S. Rasco, in Ellensburg.

For the township of Harrison, at the house recently occupied by Ira Bartolomew, in said township.
For the township of Hebron, at the school house No. 5, near Henry Ingraham's in said township.
For the township of Hector, at the Sanderlin school house, in said township.
For the township of Homer, at the school house near Jacob Peet's, in said township.
For the township of Jackson, at the house formerly occupied by Benjamin Barse, now M. Chappel, in said township.
For the township of Keating, at the house of Phily Harris in said township.
For the township of Owaygo, at the Centre school house, in said township.
For the township of Pike, at the house of Eljian Johnson, in said township.
For the township of Pleasant Valley, at the school house in said township.
For the township of Portage, at the S. Zar school house, in said township.

For the township of Porter, at the school house near George Wimer's in said township.
For the township of Swanton, at the Sharou Centre school house, near John Voorbes'.
For the township of Sweden, at the house of Asenath Targart, in said township.

For the Borough of Condersport, at the Court House in said Borough.

The officers to be elected at the time and place aforesaid are twenty-seven persons as Electors for President and Vice-President of the United States.

It is further directed that the meeting of the return judges at the Court House in Condersport to make out the general returns, shall be on the first Friday succeeding the general election, which will be the 9th day of November.

I also make known and give notice as in and by the 13th section of the aforesaid act I am directed, that every person except justices of the Peace, who holds any office of appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States or of any city or incorporated district, whether a Commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the legislative, judicial, or executive department of this State or of the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select and common council of any city, or commissioner of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or receiving at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector or Judge, or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office therein to be voted for.

Also, that in fourth section of the Act of Assembly entitled "An Act relating to elections and for other purposes," approved April 16th, 1846, it is enacted that the aforesaid 13th section shall not be so construed as to prevent any military officer or Borough officer from serving as Judge, Inspector or Clerk of any general or special election in this Commonwealth. Pursuant to the provisions of the 13th section of said act, a very general and special election shall be opened between the hours of 8 and 10 in the forenoon; and shall continue without interruption or adjournment until 7 o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed.
