CONDERSPORT, OCTOBER 11, 1860.

We had intended to get our paper out on Thursday evening, but failed, and are compelled to issue this (Friday) morning so late for the mails.

We are under obligations to our friend T. L. Young Esq., Assistant Superintendent in the Cincinnati House of Refuge, for late papers from that city. Much obliged.

Elmer Lyman, Esq., of Eleven Mile, Oswayo township, this county, hands the following description of a calf owned by A. Hammond, a neighbor of his: The calf is three months and twenty-six days old, and girls 4 feet 4 inches, and 5 feet 4 inches in length. Mr. Lyman states that he measured the calf himself. The calf is half-blood Durham, short-horn.

Mr. Lyman also states that he himself raised a field of white winter Rye, from which he pulled a bunch by the roots, which measured seven feet six inches in length—the tallest he could find in the field. These stems will do for the Eleven Mile to brag on.

General Election Proclamation PURSUANT to an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act relating to the election of this Commonwealth," approved the second day of July A. D., one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, I, Wm. F. Burt, Sheriff of the County of Potter, Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the County aforesaid, that a General Election will be held in said County of Potter on Tuesday, the 6th day of November next, being the Tuesday next after the first Monday of said month, in the several districts within the said County, to-wit:

- For the Township of Abbott, at the Germania Hotel, in said township.
For the Township of Allegheny, at the school house near the place formerly owned by Chester Andrews, in said township.
For the Township of Bingham, at the house of A. B. Lewis, in said township.
For the Township of Clara, at the school house near Sala Stevens, in said township.
For the Township of Emlenton, at the New Court House in the Borough of Condersport.
For the Township of Genesee, at the house formerly occupied by S. S. Rasco, in Ellipsisburg.

It is further directed that the meeting of the return judges at the Court House in Condersport to make out the general returns, shall be on the first Friday succeeding the general election, which will be the 9th day of November.

I do hereby make known and give notice as it and by the 13th section of the aforesaid Act I am directing that every person except justices of the Peace, who holds any office of appointment of profit at trust under the Government of the United States or of any city or incorporated district, whether a Commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the legislative, judiciary, or executive department of this State or the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select and common council of any city, or commissioner of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or receiving at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector or Judge, or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office then to be voted for.

Also, that in fourth section of the Act of Assembly entitled "An Act relating to elections and for other purposes," approved April 15th, 1840, it is enacted that the aforesaid 13th section shall not be so construed as to prevent any military officer or Borough officer from serving as Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any general or special election in this Commonwealth. Pursuant to the provisions of the 61st section of said act, "every general and special election shall be opened between the hours of 8 and 10 in the forenoon; and shall continue without interruption or adjournment until 7 o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed.
