THE TREASURY NOTES.—Since the Cabinet has become a unit, and there is some evidence of concert and determination to maintain the Government, capitalists are more inclined to sustain it with their means and influence. It is said that the five million loan will be taken several per centum lower than the last.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN JAMESTOWN, N. Y.—A terrible fire broke out in Jamestown, N. Y., on Wednesday night last, burning over 30 places of business, including the Allen House, Chautauque County and Jamestown Banks, and Hawley's Block. The books, paper and funds of the banks were saved. Loss from \$150,000 to \$200,000.

NEW TERRITORIES.—Have we not acquired three new Territories by the rebellious acts of Mississippi, Alabama and Florida? These States did not belong to the original Thirteen, but were admitted, and Florida purchased into the Union upon certain understood guarantees, at the request of their people in Convention assembled. When, therefore, they propose to go out of the Union, do they not again become the property of the Government? and are they not Territories over which Mr. Lincoln may appoint Governors and other Territorial officers? The same reasoning will apply to Louisiana, Texas and Arkansas, should they follow the wild lead of the Southern conspirators.—Philad. Press.

DEATH OF LOLA MONTEZ.—This extraordinary woman died in New York last week. Her real name was Maria Adoloris Lorrixy Montes. But her place of birth is yet a mystery. It is said her mother was a Spanish creole, and that she was brought up in England. She made her appearance in 1847; she went to Munich, where having captivated the King, she was created Countess of Salsfeld, with a pension of 20,000 florins. After a variety of conflicts with the authorities of Bavaria, Lola went to England and married a third husband. Shortly after this she came to America, where she has married several times. Some months since she was attacked by a paralytic seizure, since which her health has been gradually decaying. Her funeral place in New York on the 17th.

FORT SUMNER REINFORCED.—It is in Washington that Fort Sumter actually been reinforced in spite of the vigilance of the Charleston volunteers. It will turn out that the steamer Brooklyn took some 300 soldiers and ten or more officers to the entrance of Charleston harbor, and that in the night time rowed in small boats, with muffled oars, past the batteries on Morris Island Fort Moultrie, and are now inside of Fort Sumter. In addition to the above, N. Y. Times says editorially: "We mention as corroborative of this the fact that letters have been received in this city from a gentleman who here four weeks since, and is now in Fort Sumter.
