

ARMY ITEMS.

Congress has passed the Bill appropriating \$500,000,000 and 500,000 men for the war.

A bonus of \$30 is offered to any of the three months men who will enlist for the war, and \$40 where the whole Company enlists.

It is said that Gen. McClellen telegraphed to Gen. Scott that if he would send him three Colonels fit to command Regiments he would make a general clearing out of all rebels in Western Virginia.

There is great concentration of Rebel troops in Missouri, and trouble is anticipated. Gen. Lyon has telegraphed to Blair for reinforcements.

Gov. Jackson has left Missouri, and he and Ben McCullough are drilling a body of 17,000 Secessionists in Arkansas.

Gen. Patterson has been withdrawn from his command. It is said for the reason that he failed to move forward when commanded to do so by Scott.

Gen. Dix takes command of the Department of Maryland, and Gen. Banks will immediately move forward to the Department of the Shenandoah.

Gen. Banks succeeds Gen. Patterson, and the latter it is expected will muster the Pennsylvania Reserve Corps into the field.

An effort is being to place Col. Hooker at the head of a New York Brigade. A part of Jeff Davis' Message to the Rebel Congress has been received by way of New Orleans.

The document is a most uninteresting and unimpressive production. Its tone, however, is not very jubilant. Alex. H. Stephens is making speeches through the South trying to drum the people into giving to the Confederates \$100,000,000 worth of cotton to prosecute the war.

Gov. Jackson of Missouri owns to having lost 500 men at the battle of Carthage. The Wild Cats, under Col. Biddle, at New Creek, on their march west from Cumberland, Md., met and broke up a small Rebel company.

The Companies in the Pennsylvania Reserve Corps are to be raised to 101 men each. James Montgomery, of Kansas fame, has been appointed to a Colonelcy in the Brigade to be raised in Kansas.

Mrs. Elizabeth Barrett Browning expired at Florence on hour after daybreak on Saturday morning, June 29th. This is all we know at present of the sad event.

The wife of the poet Longfellow, last week, while lighting sealing wax, had her clothes take fire, burning her fatally. In trying to aid her, Mr. L. also suffered a severe scorching.

Glenn W. Scofield, of Warren, is appointed President Judge in place of John S. M. Calmont, a graduate of West Point, who has joined the Army.

Hon. Henry King, a native of Massachusetts, died last week in Allentown, aged 71 years. The Sultan of Turkey is dead. Lewis Dela, the witty "Bard of Tower Hall," died lately at an insane asylum.
