Gov. Stevens, of Washington Territory, is reported to have been appointed to the command of the New York Highland Regiment.

The State Road from Coudersport to Shippen, was let August 6th, to Benton & Arnold at \$2.31 per Rod. It is to be completed prior to October, 1863.  
We have received a specimen of this year's potatoes from DAVID CONWAY of Abbott; if the crop throughout the county is of the same size and quality, we think there will be no scarcity of that staple; they beat anything of that kind we have seen this year.  
The press and material of the Bradford Herald office, of Towanda, have been purchased by a gentleman of Tunkhannock, and removed to that place, where the purchaser proposes starting a democratic paper.  
We learn that another case of lynching has just happened in this county. A secessionist from the South was shaved and tarred in Broklyu, last Monday. Now, Democrat, how your loudest! Defend your brother traitor!—Susquehanna Republican.

Prince Napoleon, accompanied by M. Mercier, the French Minister, Mr. Seward, Assistant Secretary of State, and a portion of his suite, left New York for Washington on the 21st ult., where they will be entertained by Pres. Lincoln and Cabinet.  
See the call for the Republican County Convention, it would be well for those purposing to be candidates to announce themselves at an early day. Recommendations to receive attention must be paid in advance. Announcements, \$1 each from now till Meeting of Convention. The following officers are to be selected at the coming election: One President Judge, two Associate Judges, one Commissioner, one Auditor, one Coroner, and two Members of Assembly.

We find the following honorable mention of one of our Coudersport citizens in the Washington National Intelligencer of the 27th ult:  
"Among the gentlemen very actively and efficiently engaged in restoring order to the frightened and jammed-up baggage trains and to others, after the battle of Sunday, and saving arms and other property abandoned on the field," were Lieut. WEBSTER of the Navy, and Capt. OVERTON, (unattached,) of the Army, who both exerted themselves till after midnight very effectively, we learn."

Another call is about being made upon the patriots of Potter county to furnish men for the Army of the Union. J. K. HAFNEY, Recruiting Officer of Kane's Rifle Regiment, will be in Coudersport on Friday to receive recruits; it being required, under the new regulations, to increase the number in each Company from 77 to 101. This Regiment has been successful in several encounters with the enemy and if there are any of those who did not get the right kind of fighting the first time they started and who still desire to find what it really is, at the same time aid in crushing the rebellion that is attempting to overthrow their Government, they can be accommodated by joining this Regiment.

There is very little or nothing of importance in the movements of the army during the past week. Many thousands more of troops are congregating about Washington. Gen. McClellan is not yet ready for an advance movement, and the Rebels do not fancy making that movement themselves, they prefer lying behind their entrenchments. Gen. Cox has cleaned the Kanawha Valley, Virginia, of Rebels, and it is thought that he and Gen. Rosecranz will join armies and move into Tennessee to drive out the Rebels from that section and to protect the Union residents. Gens. Lyon, Fremont, and Sigel, are "fixing things" in Missouri and along the Western border. The Missouri State Convention, having declared the State offices, lately occupied by the traitor Jackson and others of the same school, vacant, have appointed good men and true, to the position. The Union men are returning to their homes and it is more than probable that Missouri remains true to the Union.

We regret to learn that Ulysses Academy has lost its accomplished Principal. Mr. Cooper has accepted a Professorship—the Department of Natural Sciences—in the Normal School, Edinboro, Pa. We are assured by those acquainted with him that he is eminently qualified for the position. Our regret at his leaving the flourishing young school, which his talents has raised to a commanding position, is mingled with pleasure that he has been transferred to a broader sphere of usefulness. Mr. E. R. Campbell, late School Commissioner of Alleghany county, N. Y., succeeds Prof. Cooper. Though somewhat less acquainted with Ancient Languages and Literature, Mr. C.'s large experience in teaching is a sufficient warrant that the Institution will lose nothing by this change. His large experience in teaching particularly commends him to those preparing for that pursuit. Prof. Davies, celebrated author of a series of Mathematical works, will hold a Teacher's Institute in connection with the school, about the middle of the Fall Term. A correspondent having noticed the article in regard to "Hilling Corn," which appeared in a late issue of the Journal, writes as follows:  
"I think the article headed, 'hilling corn,' is in the science of agriculture a step backward. I have experimented a little on the subject, and every successive year's experience and observation convinces me that flat culture is, as a general rule, better than hilling. What benefit can be derived from taking the earth from the extremity of the roots and leaving them exposed to the heat of the sun? The article on the subject, if it proves anything proves too much. The writer says: 'so in order to make our experiment a fair test, we set to work with our hoe and to each alternate hill we drew up the earth covering the shoots to an average depth of eight inches.' That would be eleven inches of earth hood up; the hole that the earth would betaken from would make as much more, making a hill of twenty-two inches. If the corn was planted three feet apart, the hilling could not be done without removing all the mellow earth from the corn not hilled, and, as might have been expected, it produced a very small crop.  
"I would like to have the opinion of my brother-farmers on the subject. Please call the attention of corn-hillers to the subject, let them give their reasons for hilling, and show if they can what benefit is derived from it.—D.C."

**Accident.**  
The youngest son of Mr. Charles Hill, of this place, aged eight years, was killed yesterday under the most painful circumstances. He started for school in the morning alone; at supper time he did not come home, and it was found that he had not been at school; his little brothers were sent to look for him, and soon found him only a few rods from home, lying under a heavy banking-log, which had rolled from the lower side of the road. Their screams soon brought assistance, and the body was removed. His back and right shoulder were broken, and from appearances he must have been killed instantly. His head lay down the bank and as there was no wound for the blood to flow, and the face was discolored as badly as flesh could be. How he could have lain there all day without being discovered, seems inexplicable. The school children passed to and from their dinners, and home again at night, and people were passing frequently all day. School was to have closed to-day with a little celebration, instead of that, the children are attending Horatio's funeral.
