What their action will be we do not know, neither do we care, it is enough for Republicans to know that the main movers in it are old-line Whiskey Democrats whose chief end and aim is to break up the Republican organization, open the whiskey-jugs and make Potter county the pandemonium it was in days past.

Capt. A. F. JONES of Coudersport is about starting another Company for the War; so far he has met with a success as unexpected as it is gratifying, and at the present rate will be able to start in a very short time.

On motion, the proceedings of this Conference were ordered to be printed in all the newspapers of this District.

On motion, the Convention adjourned sine die. ISAAC BENSON, Pres't. C. D. WEBSTER, Sec'y.

Dr. A. Stout, and H. J. Olmsted, appeared for Potter county, and Hugh Young, and Jerome B. Niles, for Tioga county. On motion, H. J. Olmsted was elected President, and Jerome B. Niles Secretary.

Republican Judicial Convention. The conferees from the several counties composing the 4th Judicial District met at the Bennett House, at Coudersport, on Saturday afternoon, the 21st inst., and organized by electing Hon. Isaac Benson President, and C. D. Webster Secretary.

The following gentlemen presented their credentials and took their seats as conferees of the counties named: Cameron, E. B. Eldred, L. G. Cook; Elk, Henry Souther, S. A. Ross; McKean, C. D. Webster, D. J. Keyes and N. F. Marsh; Potter, Isaac Benson, A. F. Jones, H. J. Olmsted; Tioga, John R. Bowen, Hugh Young.

On motion, each of the counties were allowed three votes, some of the conferees not being present.

The Conference then proceeded to make nominations. Hugh Young nominated Hon. R. G. White, of White; E. B. Eldred nominated C. B. Curtis, of Warren. There being no other nominations, the Convention proceeded to ballot, with the following result: For White 12; for Curtis 3. On motion of E. B. Eldred, the nomination of R. G. White, was declared unanimous, by acclamation.

On motion, Hon. Henry Souther, E. B. Eldred, D. J. Keyes, John R. Bowen, and H. J. Olmsted, were appointed a committee to wait upon Hon. R. G. White, and inform him of his nomination. The committee, after a brief absence, reported that they had performed the duty assigned them; that Judge White had accepted the nomination, and desired through them, to express his thanks to the Conference, and to the people of the District, for this renewed expression of their confidence.

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three years of the present apportionment, therefore, Resolved, That we the Representative Conferees of Tioga County feel authorized and do hereby pledge the Republican party of said county to carry out in good faith the aforesaid resolution by supporting for the office of Representative, one person in Potter county, and one in Tioga county, for each of the three years yet remaining under the present apportionment.

Dr. A. Stout announced that he was authorized to withdraw the name of A. G. Olmsted, whereupon the nomination of Messrs. Straeg and Elliott, was made unanimous. On motion, the Convention adjourned sine die. H. J. OLMSTED, Pres't. J. B. NILES, Sec'y.
