MASON and Slidell's capture is pronounced by judges to have been entirely consistent with all the rules of International Law. The hope evidenced in "secessh" that this act would give England a plausible excuse for interfering in our domestic troubles will scarcely be realized, as the taking of Mason and Slidell is nothing more than following out the course England has chosen to adopt both towards this and other countries. There is one truth that the English will not be apt to forget at this juncture and it is that they are in a very great measure dependant upon the United States for the wheat that keeps starvation from the doors of their peasantry, and even more so than in some former years. The loss of the crop there may have been a "God-send" to us.

ANOTHER semi-secession paper is being issued in New York city by the publisher of the Day Book, lately suppressed by the Government for its treason. This new paper—the Caucasian—while it does not profess to discuss the war or the measures of the Administration, it yet seeks to create a feeling against the Government by professing to believe that the only object of the North—the Abolition part, in which it classes the administration—is to free the slaves and then let the Government look out for itself. This paper and its Editor are the very essence of New York treason and we very much doubt that man's loyalty who will either procure for it subscribers or give its prospectus a complimentary position in their columns as we see the Editors of some Breckinridge papers doing.
