SYNOPSIS OF WAR NEWS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25, 1862.—The War Department has issued a general order to the effect that measures are to be taken to secure the comfort of Union prisoners in the hands of the rebels.

The Savannah Republican, of the 22d inst., states that the Union troops captured Cedar Keys, on the Florida coast, on the 16th.

The Norfolk and Richmond papers do not believe the accounts of the Somerset battle which reached them.

From the Burnside expedition we have no news. The Norfolk Day-Book declares that the report of the vessels being in Paullico Sound is false.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27, 1862.—There is no intelligence of the Burnside expedition, now fifteen days out.

It appears that the rebels knew that they were to be attacked on Monday, and must fight or retreat, hence their temerity in leaving their entrenchments and attacking us in the open field.

MERIDIAN HILL, Jan. 20, 1862. EDITOR OF THE JOURNAL: Our Regt. is still in Camp Warren, drilling and hoping for orders to advance.

I would add, that since their enlistment no member of my company has been intoxicated, not one has been in arrest, or even put on extra duty.

The weather is very disagreeable, rain and mud without measure for the last week, but the boys make light of the inconveniences caused by it.
