We give in another column a short report of the greatest victories of the war. Fort Mifflin is between the Cumberland and Tennessee rivers, twenty miles above Clarksville, and sixty miles above Nashville, Tenn. At the latter place they are to inaugurate Jeff Davis President of the Southern Confederacy on Saturday of this week. It is most likely that our troops will take a "holiday" and witness his "inauguration." There are over 100,000 Union troops in Tennessee. Our troops have destroyed a great many of the Rebel gun boats on the river, and have penetrated "recess" as far as Florence, Alabama.
