Benton, Chaplain of the 51st New York Volunteers, who was killed at Newbern. Fredrika Bremer, the popular Swedish authoress, has written an address to her American friends congratulating them on the issuing of President Lincoln's Message in favor of emancipation. She praises the President very highly, and thinks that the nation is now about to be redeemed from the great evil of Slavery which has so long divided its counsels and retarded its prosperity.

The President recently transmitted to the Senate a Message, in response to a resolution, to the effect that Gen. Stone was arrested at his instance and by his order, and that he should have as speedy a trial as was consistent with the public interest; but that the exigencies of the service were such that neither officers to form, nor witnesses to attend, a Court martial could at present be spared from the field.

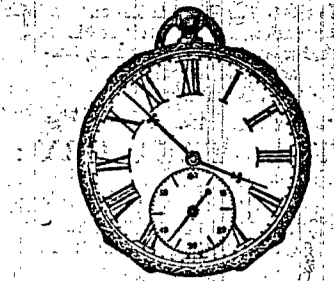
