We are glad to learn that the commission creating Sergt. ARTHUR B. MANN, 2nd Lieut., has been forwarded by Gov. Curtin. Our young friend has gained this honor by hard-fought and earnestly performed duties, and we know of no one more deserving of such promotion.

The synopsis of news from the Richmond papers, which we copy in another column, will give the Northern people some hint as to the influence of the treason that is daily talked upon our streets by persons not only claiming to be gentlemen, but intelligent, loyal men.

The House has passed a resolution to the effect, that no creditors of the Government are so meritorious as the Union soldiers, and that no more money should be paid to any civil officer of the Government until every arrearage due in any regiment in the service was fully paid. Judge Hale warmly supported the measure.

According to the Auditor General's Report, Potter county is the only county in which the accused traffic in whiskey is not licensed. So much more honor for the integrity of our people—There will be an attempt made at the approaching session of our Court to procure a license for a "tavern" in the eastern part of the county; that it will fall is merely to prophesy what will soon become part of the records.

What we prophesied before the election has proven true.
