Petitions have been sent to the Legislature of Pennsylvania, for a law to prevent the payment of wages of operatives, in store orders. A bill of the kind is now before the Senate and will probably pass that body and become a law. We hope it may.

Hon. Joseph Lewis, of Pennsylvania, has been nominated by the President Commissioner of Internal Revenue, in place of Governor Boutwell.

During the Aaron Burr conspiracy Thos. Jefferson not only made arbitrary arrests, but justified them; everybody knows that Gen'l Jackson did the same at New Orleans and also justified them—yet those who pretend to be disciples of those great men rail at President Lincoln for the same act.

At a concert lately given by the Baker family in Mason county, Illinois, a copperhead got into a terrible rage, kicked up a disturbance and left the house in a swearing passion, at the staging of what he called a "d—d Abolition song." The song was the "Star-Spangled Banner."

Now when the snow is being melted from the side-walks, let every owner of property clean off the fifth deposited during the winter. Some of our walks are in a horrible condition, and a decent regard for the comfort of the ladies should make this a matter of duty.

The New Hampshire election has gone Republican. There was no choice of Governor by the people. The Republicans have more than three-fourths of the Legislature and will no doubt elect a Republican to that position. Two of the three members of Congress are also Republicans. This is old Democratic New Hampshire.

The President has issued a Proclamation calling all absent or straggling soldiers to return to their regiments immediately, or expect to suffer the penalties of military law. All who report themselves at any rendezvous specified by General order No. 58 of the War Department will suffer no punishment except forfeiture of pay during absence.

The bill authorizing privateering passed into a law and was signed by the President. We have volunteers on hand to defend the old flag, why should we not follow the example of our fathers during the first and second wars for independence, and authorize letters of marque, so that maritime volunteers may be instantly organized?

Secretary Welles has managed to augment his appropriations so as to enable him to get on with the Navy until March, 1863. It is also understood that the appropriations are sufficient for Army purposes, up to the same time. Therefore, should the next House be Democratic, it will not be able to embarrass the government in carrying on the War.

The President the other day received a package of green-backs amounting to \$898, which the sender said in a letter enclosed he obtained from the Government dishonestly. The letter is dated, Brooklyn, March 2, 1863, and signed Candido Steuro. Baruaum is after such a rare specimen from the vicinity of New York!

After Gen. Fitz John Porter was cashiered and dismissed from the service, the Democratic authorities of New York city, proposed to give him a reception. But the Mayor promptly vetoed it. Good! There is some sense left there yet.

Gov. Sprague of Rhode Island, has resigned to take his place as U. S. Senator. Having no acting Lieut. Governor, the presiding-officer of the Senate, Wm. C. Cozens, become Governor in fact.

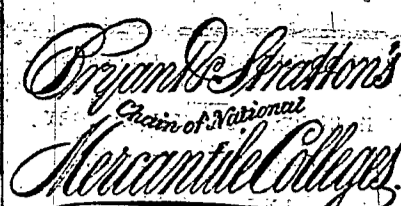
