On Friday of this week Jeff Davis and his "christian" army are to have a Fast Day. Fast Days will no doubt soon be fashionable among the Rebs, if flour continues at \$100 a barrel.

Hon. W. W. Ketchum, late Senator from the Luzerne District, has been appointed by President Lincoln to be Associate Justice of the United States in Nebraska Territory.

There are active measures on foot for raising a colored regiment in Pittsburg. But give the negro a faint hope of promotion and he will be willing and earnest in his efforts to put down the Oppressor's Rebellion.

The Hon. James Pollock, Director of the United States Mint, in his recent report, suggests that a simple inscription: "God our trust," or some equally expressive motto be in future placed upon coins. We trust his suggestion may be adopted.

The exorbitant prices of sugar will greatly stimulate the manufacture of Maple Sugar. It will be well for our farmers to get their buckets, pails, and tubs in readiness for the coming season. The "sap bush" will be doubly interesting.

Give it a fair trial, and the result must prove favorable.

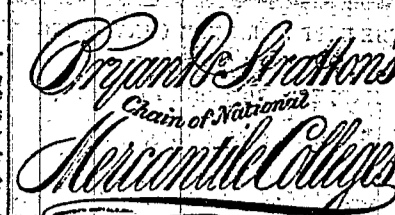
