INTERESTING TO SCHOOL-TEACHERS AND DIRECTORS.—Certificates to teachers issued by county superintendents, and certificates by president and secretary of board of directors to county superintendent that schools have been open and in operation according to law, must each have a ten cent stamp affixed; and that "agreements or contracts between teachers and board of directors, to teach," must each have a five-cent stamp affixed.

The Spring Examinations of Teachers will be held by the County Superintendent at the following times and places, commencing at 10 A. M. Writing materials will be needed.
