

A REDUKE TO COPPERHEADS AND CROAKERS.—An exciting incident of the war occurred at the Merchants' Exchange Room this morning, while the good news from General Grant's army was being read from the bulletin board. One of the persons present not apparently relishing the news, made some disparaging remark in respect to Gen. Grant, when he was suddenly accosted by a stranger and denounced as a copperhead for his want of faith in his country's cause, &c. This drew a crowd around the stranger, who, not at all dismayed by his opponents, presented his card to the bystanders and announced himself as Colonel T. H. Gibbs, of East Tennessee, a refugee from rebel oppression. He then spoke a few minutes, expressing his sentiments in regard to the war, urging its vigorous prosecution and deprecating that want of faith in the Government sometimes observable at the North, and denouncing the course of the copperheads, who he said little knew the oppression practiced by the rebels against all loyal men in the border States. Mr. Gibbs soon had the sympathies of his audience with him, and was afterwards introduced and cordially received by those who had listened to his patriotic remarks. Mr. Gibbs is a vigorous man of the Parson Brownlow stamp, and was robbed of his property in East Tennessee by the rebels. He acted as guide to General Grant's army for four months previous to the battle of Pittsburg Landing.—Boston Journal.
