The 46th Regiment having re-enlisted are home on furlough. Fifty-three belong to this county. We published the names of company G a few weeks ago, and will publish the names of company H next week. After their long sojourn in the field they intend to have a lively time for the few days they are among their friends. They will have a party in the Court House on next Thursday evening, with a supper at Mr. Glassmire.

We are pleased to know that the Academy at this place will again be opened on the 29th of the present month. The Rev. Mr. Elliott is a gentleman well fitted for this task, and his administration will doubtless prove successful.

THE DRAFT.

The following is given by the Marshal of this District as an approximation of our quota:

This is understood to mean 203 as the actual number of men Potter county will be required to furnish under the call of the President last January and the last call; 50 per cent. being added in ease of a draft. It will be noticed that each Borough and township forms a distinct and separate sub-district, which is much the best and fairest way of dividing the different counties. Our people will feel very grateful to Captain Blair for this change.

The Commissioners advertise in our columns to-day a bounty of Three Hundred Dollars. This is a very liberal offer and should be made use of by the different townships to relieve the people of the burden of the draft. If efforts are directed in the proper channel and by proper persons it will require but a short time to fill the quota—indeed, there is but a short time left in which to work. We will say more about this offer of the Commissioners in our next, and will now only say that it is necessary, just and equitable.

There is no war news of much importance. A number of Union prisoners have escaped from Libby Prison—some were recaptured. Some skirmishing in the direction of Knoxville with no vital results. The Conscription Act has passed finally—the \$300 clause remains and both classes are united. Volunteering is rapidly progressing all over the North. Large numbers of rebel deserters join our lines daily.

GOVERNOR LEITCHER said recently in an address at Canville, Virginia, that "Stonewall" Jackson was in favor of conducting the war under the black flag, and so expressed himself several days after the secession of Virginia, proposed to set the example by first carrying that flag in the face of the enemy. Jackson was a model "Christian."

THE number of Poles who have died on the field of battle, or been executed during the present insurrection, amounts to twelve thousand, and of those who have been banished, eight thousand.

John G. Whittier, the poet states that while Wm. Lloyd Garrison was in prison in Baltimore in 1839, Henry Clay wrote from Lexington, Kentucky, to a friend in Baltimore "directing him to pay the fine and costs, and liberate Mr. Garrison." This fact has not been publicly known until very recently.

HALE and hearty conscripts who get exempted on the ground of "weakness in the spine," may be said to be adroit in the game of backgammon.

Some days since, a lady called at a daguerrean establishment in Oxford, New York, to have a photograph taken of her niece, a little child then with her. The photograph was taken, and while the lady was waiting to have it finished, the little girl strayed into the laboratory, and swallowed some kind of poison which she found there. When missed and looked for she was found in the laboratory, dead, having expired almost immediately. The aunt has since become insane.

Gov. Gamble of Missouri died very suddenly a few days ago. His funeral took place with imposing honors on the 31st instant. The Lieutenant Governor, Hall, becomes Governor till the Fall election. The radicals in Washington declare that they can carry the State by a large majority.

A HAPPY HIT.—At the reception of the Forty-sixth Regiment P. V., yesterday, in the Capitol grounds, Mr. Smith (a member of the House from Chester county) addressed the soldiers, declaring that he did not know what to do to gratify them, so large were their claims upon the public. "At this speech," one of the veterans cried out, "Let the Legislature or, ganize and stop quibbling about politics, and we will consider ourselves repaid for our hardships." In reply to this another soldier exclaimed, "There are too many copperheads in the Senate to effect a peaceful organization." In reply to the soldier, Colonel Selfridge (a war Democrat) waved his hand toward the serried ranks of his gallant regiment, and exclaimed in a voice of thunder, "There are no copperheads here!" For a moment the scene was an exciting one, the cheers of the people and those of the soldiers indicating how they estimated copperheadism.—Harrisburg Telegraph.

The Senate has so amended the Enrollment Act, that none but such as are in service, or who have been in the service two years, and have been honorably discharged, are exempted from the operations of the draft. This throws all who served in the nine months' regiments into the classes liable to draft. They still have one advantage over other men, and but one, that is, they get a bounty of \$402 if they enlist, while others get only \$302. No doubt many of them will now "go in." Those who were drafted in 1862, will also be liable to draft.

The Harrisburg Telegraph makes a powerful and well-timed appeal to the unconditional Union men of this Commonwealth to commence and energetically prosecute the work of organization preparatory to the presidential election. What is primarily needed is the dissemination of knowledge on the vital questions at issue among the people. This is a labor of no less magnitude than importance. It is second only to the reinforcement of the armies in the field. We commend the matter, in an especial manner, to the consideration of those gentlemen who have the Union organization of this county in their hands.

The member of Congress from Arkansas elected by the new state convention, has presented his claim for a seat.
