There is some severe fighting being done on the Potomac, and as far as heard from Lee is getting the worst of it.

The old Penn. Mansion, in Philadelphia, is to be purchased by the Pennsylvania Historical Society, which has raised \$300,000 for that purpose.

The State Convention which met at Harrisburg on the 28th ult., declared in favor of Abraham Lincoln as candidate for President the coming Fall.

The receipts from internal Revenue last month amounted to upward of ten millions of dollars, by far the largest amount received in any one month from that source since the law went into operation.

Secretary Chase has just received a queer deposit from the War Department, being \$2,000,000, of Confederate money captured on Red River. The great question is, what will he do with it?

Thomas H. Benton, in a letter written two years before his death, said: "The rebellion is ready to break out; we shall soon see it; its pretense is slavery, the reality behind it is aristocratic institutions. Before adjourning it was proposed in the Maryland Legislature to tax bachelors above twenty-five years of age, not less than twenty-five dollars a head per annum, and double the amount on bachelors over forty-five years of age—the tax to be applied to the support and education of the children of Maryland soldiers who die in the service.

Both branches of the Pennsylvania Legislature have passed the bill providing for a special election throughout the State on the First Tuesday in August next, at which the people shall decide whether the proposed amendments to the Constitution permitting soldiers to vote shall be adopted. The Legislature is to meet on the 23d day of August to receive the returns of the election.

PHILADELPHIA FAIR.—It is most gratifying to hear the news of preparation going on all over the country to make the Sanitary Fair of Philadelphia a grand success. Everywhere the good work progresses. The employees on the Pennsylvania Railroad are moving in the matter, and intend giving "a day's labor" to the patriotic cause, while the corporation has already given ten thousand dollars.

The Committee on Horticulture of the Great Central Fair have addressed a circular calling for all kinds of flowers, shrubbery, &c., for the exhibition in June. Bouquets and other perishable articles should be sent so as to arrive in Philadelphia not earlier than the first Monday of June. Daily contributions of this description are solicited during the continuance of the Fair. They should be addressed "Great Central Fair, Logan Square, Philadelphia Horticultural Department, care of D. THE NEW LOAN.—Sec. Chase's 5-20 loan having been all taken up months ago, he has placed another in the market, which is advertised in to-day's paper, under the head of "U. S. 10-40 Bonds." The advertisement explains the matter in a clear, comprehensive way. The Secretary appeals to the great mass of the people to sustain the Government by subscribing to this loan. There is no more secure investment to be made, as the whole country is pledged to sustain it. If the people come forward with their surplus in gold, and take up the different loans which the Secretary places in the market, our armies will be sustained, the war ended sooner than it otherwise would be, Union arms would triumph, and the bonds would be as good as gold. On the other hand, should they withhold and hoard up their capital and legal tender, or invest in stocks or individual securities, and thus allow the Union to go by the board, what would all their green-backs, individual securities, and the like, be worth? Perhaps 5 cents a pound, and perhaps not so much. The interest on these bonds will be paid promptly in gold, although it is but 5 per cent. It is equivalent, at present, to 7 or 8 per cent. in popular currency. To sustain the arms which protect our homes from the ravages of Jeff. Davis' barbarians, the currency must be sustained. Capitalists are well aware of this fact, and they are consequently taking up the loan at the rate of nearly a million a day, having implicit confidence in the security of the investment, as well as in the righteousness of the cause.
