The following is a letter from Wm. A. Monroe, giving the names of some of those killed in the late battles: WASHINGTON, May 16, 1864. Ed. JOURNAL: I send a list of the killed from Potter county as far as could be gathered from the wounded in our hospitals—the wounded you undoubtedly have before this. Of the 53d Pa., James Blackman, of Hector and John Koss, of Ellensburg, were killed while on the post of duty. Co. K, 149, Benjamin Higley, Hebron, O. Courtwright, Warton; Daniel Elliott, Eulalia, John Butler, Germania. These were all instantly killed. They are highly spoken of by their wounded comrades as brave and faithful soldiers. Co. G, 149 Pa., Lieut. A. B. Horton, of Brookland. I cannot close without paying a slight tribute to so good and brave a man. He fell as becomes a soldier, on the extreme front in the very rage of battle. He was shot through the heart, while leading a charge on the enemies works, on the evening of the second days engagement. There was much in his fine, manly character worthy of emulation. Few, living, would be more useful, none better prepared to die. He gave his life to Heaven for his country's sake, and his loss will be severely felt by all who knew him, but more especially by his comrades in arms to whom he was justly dear.

Court Proclamation. WHEREAS the Hon. Robert G. White, President Judge, and the Hon. C. S. Jones and G. G. To All Whom it May Concern. By information, this day received from the A. A. Provost Marshal General of Pennsylvania, it has been ascertained that a large number of Soldiers are credited to the 15th Military District of Pennsylvania, or counties therein, at large, without a designation of particular localities. The number thus credited at large, will be distributed to the special credits of Sub-Districts establishing claims to proportionate and additional credits. The representatives of the several Sub-Districts in this District, are required to produce before the Board of Enrollment, without delay, satisfactory evidence that their Sub-Districts are entitled to credits in addition to those already assigned. Evidence: "Additional credits to Sub-Districts will be assigned upon the evidence of original and supplementary Muster-in Roll, or certificates of U. S. Mustering Officers, or officers detailed on recruiting service for the Regular Army, on the different Boards of Enrollment." "Credits not assigned by Muster-in Roll, or by Supplementary Rolls, or by the exhibits furnished by the A. A. Provost Marshal General of Pennsylvania to this office, to particular Sub-District or localities belonging to Sub-District, but to Districts, counties, or cities at large, may be assigned to Sub-Districts within the respective districts, counties, or cities, provided, that sufficient evidence be given in each case, that the Sub-District claiming the credit has either paid a local bounty for the recruit for which the credit is claimed, or is the actual residence of such soldier and that the recruit was not paid a local bounty from any other Sub-District or county." A Joint Resolution proposing certain amendments to the Constitution. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof: There shall be an additional section to the third article of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows: "Section 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are, or shall be, prescribed by law, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election." Section 2. There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight, and nine, as follows: "Section 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature, containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills." "Section 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, where the authority to grant such powers, or privileges, has been, or may hereafter be, conferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth." The above Resolution having been agreed to by a majority of the members of each House, at two successive sessions of the General Assembly of this Commonwealth, the proposed amendments will be submitted to the people, for their adoption or rejection, on the first Tuesday of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article of the Constitution, and the act entitled "An Act prescribing the time and manner of submitting to the people, for their approval and ratification or rejection, the proposed amendments to the Constitution," approved the twenty-third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.
