The funeral sermon of Capt. DENNIS H. CHESSBRO, killed at the battle of Dallas, in Georgia, will be preached in the Homer School House on Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, July 3, 1864.

We see that our Borough fathers have determined to improve the sidewalks in the village. It is time they are in a horrid condition. See to it that it is well and speedily done.

We are pleased to learn that our friend C. H. Simmons, is again on his feet and so far recovered from his late severe wound as to be able to fill up his store with New Goods of his own selection.

There will be three elections this year, the first for or against the Constitutional Amendments on the 2nd day of August; the General Election on the 2nd Tuesday of October; and the Presidential election in November.
