Hon. S. F. Willson was nominated for Congress and Hon. John W. Guernsey for Assembly in Tioga County.

We last week stated that the Congressional Conference met at Williamsport, on the 8th—it should have been the first of September.

We this week publish the Court Proceedings for September term. It is expected that there will be no business done until Thursday, as there is no Jury summoned and no Issue List published.

The Republicans of Clinton met in Convention on the 9th inst., and nominated Hon. Wm. H. Armstrong, of Lycoming, for Congress. He received 55 votes out of 68.—The County Convention of Lycoming also nominated him.

It was some time ago announced that the connecting rails were laid between the Eastern and Western divisions on the P. & E. Railroad. But the cars will hardly run before the road goes into the possession of the Pennsylvania Company.

At the Ice Cream Festival at Mr. A. G. Olmsted's on the night of Tuesday the 2d of August the sum of \$18.55 and at the Festival at Mr. J. M. Hamilton's on the night of the 18th of August the sum of \$18.45 were realized for the benefit of the Hospital Aid Society at this place.

The Chicago correspondent of the Missouri Democrat says the wire-pullers of the Chicago Convention are agitating the name of Gen. T. W. Sherman, commanding the Army of the Cumberland, as the Democratic nominee for the Presidency. Good—if the old confederator, exterminator, emancipationist and war horse who would take a nomination from peace snails!

The men who have enlisted under Capt. Graves will rendezvous at Oswayo village, Aug. 30, and will leave for Wellsville about 10 a. m. Sharon township has furnished ten men under the last call. Let the other townships work vigorously as the draft is published to come off by the 5th. If it does not on that day it cannot be expected to be deferred for a long time. Better enlist for one year with a large bounty than be drafted with a small bounty.

Rooms have been secured in Philadelphia, as a headquarters for the Union State Central Committee, where the officers thereof, and the members of the Executive Committee, will hereafter be found for the transaction of the business allotted to that body. The old Backtail Regiment will be pleased to learn that their original commander and devoted friend, Gen. T. L. Kane, has recently returned from the effects of the wound he received at Harrisonburg, over two years since. The General who has been making his headquarters at the house of Willis Barrett, in Keating township, for some time past, was one of the first at the polls on Tuesday last, and of course deposited his vote in favor of the franchise of the soldier.—McKen Miner.

Gov. Johnson has issued a proclamation ordering an election in Tennessee for the purpose of bringing that State within the provision of the United States Constitution, which guarantees to each State a Republican form of Government. He has fixed the time some months ahead, for the election is to be held on the first Saturday of next March. A complete precinct, county and State organization is to be effected, and the Governor proclaims that the enemies of the Union will not be permitted to vote or to hold office.

A correspondent of the "Tioga Agitator" writing from Harrisburg, says: "The delegation from your district—Messrs. Wilson, Guernsey, and Olmsted—are in their seats and at work. Tioga has no cause to be ashamed of her representatives. They are classed among the best men here. They are ever fully awake to the interests of their immediate constituents, and the welfare of the country at large. Honest, industrious and capable, they command and receive the respect and confidence of all who know them.
