

U. S. 7-80 LOAN.

The Secretary of the Treasury gives notice that subscriptions will be received for Coupon Treasury Notes, payable from Aug. 15th, 1864, with semi-annual interest at the rate of seven and three-tenths per cent. per annum.

These notes will be convertible at the option of the holder at maturity, into six per cent. gold bearing bonds, payable not less than five nor more than twenty years from their date, as the Government may elect.

The notes will be transmitted to the owners free of transportation charges as soon after the receipt of the original Certificate of Deposit as they can be prepared.

As the notes draw interest from August 15, persons making deposits subsequent to that date must pay the interest accrued from date of note to date of deposit.

Parties depositing twenty-five thousand dollars and upwards for these notes at any one time will be allowed a commission of one-quarter of one per cent. which will be paid by the Treasury Department upon the receipt of the bill for the amount, certified to by the officer with whom the deposit was made.

MINK AND GREENBACKS. TO Hunters and Trappers in Southern Allegany and Northern Pennsylvania it is known, that from this till further notice, the subscribers will pay FIVE DOLLARS EACH in greenbacks, for all healthy living Mink, delivered to them in Wellville. These Mink are now worthless for fur, and will remain comparatively so for three or four months, their skins not being prime till about the middle of December. Whole Bitters of Mink now prevail on the tributaries of the Genesee and Allegany, and can be taken in box traps. Persons catching them have only to keep them confined in a box well ventilated and kept in a cool place, with a dish of good pure water at all times in the box, and half a dozen if caught can be brought to market at once.
