Rising suddenly in his bed, his eyes blazing with the fire that consumed him, he cried with a trumpet voice, "Boys, keep your eyes on that flag!" and fell back dead.

London is now connected with Sidon and Jerusalem by telegraph! How strange to see the old Bible Lands invaded by modern inventions and improvements. In another year our shores may be within one day's communication with the Holy Land. A telegram dispatch from Jerusalem at noon may reach us before noon of the next day!

The cash receipts of the Central Fair for the relief of sick and wounded soldiers, held in Philadelphia in June last, amount to \$1,071,130. Well done, Pennsylvania! That is popular majority.

The last report of the Commissioners of Internal Revenue tax is about \$16,000,000 a month, or nearly \$200,000,000 a year.

In the Congressional District, composed of the counties of Dauphin, Union, Snyder, North D., and Juniata, Geo. F. Miller, Union, of Lewisburg, is elected by 527 majority. Mr. Miller has fought his way up from among the poor masses to the leading position at the Union County Bar, is honest, one of the most energetic workers we have ever known, generous almost to a fault, a sound Republican, and will make an able, upright representative.

In the Lycoming, Union and Snyder, Assembly and Senatorial Districts: Wallis, Democrat, is elected to the Senate by 147 majority; Wilson, Dem., to the Assembly by 16 maj.; Orwig and Alleman, Union, to the Assembly, by 34 and 43 majority respectively. There remains the vote of one Company which has not been counted, and which it is thought in a contest for the seat will vote Wilson and elect Manly, the Union candidate of Lycoming.

The election in the county passed off very quietly, with here and there an item to laugh at or feel mortified over. In one township four deserters from the draft appeared early in the morning and voted for Little Mac—of course, we did not expect anything else than that they would do so, and consequently put that down as one of Mac's "natural rights." In Sweden, a fool (or at least a man who can't tell the difference between five cents and fifty dollars) also voted for Mac. He was put under oath (which we consider a foolish proceeding as he cannot understand the nature of an oath) and asked whether he had paid his taxes, he answered "yes." He was then asked with what he was assessed? "With one of C—w's cows." "Fools and children sometimes tell the truth."—In this place the voters were out by daylight and before ten o'clock all but five votes were polled. Early in the morning the Macites gave us fifteen majority in the Borough with five majority for Mac in the township. In the evening we took 37 majority in the borough and 8 maj. in the township, making a gain of 21 maj. out of 100 votes cast on the 6th of October. We never saw a more careful looking pack of politicians than our Copperhead opponents were on that evening. They frequented their holes and have been scarcely visible since.

THE GRAND RESULT.
Our returns justify the conclusion that President Lincoln will receive the Electoral Vote of the following States:

Table listing states and electoral votes: MAINE 7, NEW HAMPSHIRE 7, MASSACHUSETTS 13, RHODE-ISLAND 4, VERMONT 6, CONNECTICUT 6, PENNSYLVANIA 26, DELAWARE 3, NEW YORK 32, MARYLAND 11, OHIO 21, INDIANA 13, MICHIGAN 11, ILLINOIS 16, WISCONSIN 10, MINNESOTA 4, IOWA 4, KANSAS 3.

This is independent of the Pacific States, which have probably chosen 11 Electors for Lincoln. ABRAHAM LINCOLN is RE-ELECTED PRESIDENT by a very large Electoral and still more decisive popular majority. He can no longer be taunted as a 'minority' President, and no practical question can arise as to the counting of the votes of dubious States. He is the choice of the American People by a preponderance which must disconcert and baffle the conspirators for North Western and other Rebel-parasite Confederacies. His Administration is stamped with popular approbation, and he may now go on with the work of subduing Rebellion, while restoring and pacifying the Union. With four years before him, it is hardly possible that he should not succeed.

Andrew Johnson is likewise elected Vice President. Like Lincoln, a self-made man, born a 'poor white' in a Slave State, he has been reaped by circumstances into one of the most determined, effective enemies of the Rebel Slave Power. The country has few sounder or purer patriots than Vice President Hamlin, whom we shall spare from public life with regret; but he could give place to no man worthier, better or more acceptable than Andrew Johnson.—Tribune.
