**THOSE LIABLE TO DRAFT!**  
 The following is published for the benefit of all concerned. Let its requirements be immediately complied with, as far as relates to the appointing of Committees and procuring proof for use when the officers visit this County.—Let every one read the order, obey it, and "forever after hold their peace." We have something more to say about this next week.

Order No. 152. As soon as the present draft shall have been completed, the Commission and Surgeon of each Board of Enrollment are directed to proceed to the county seat of the counties composing their Districts and there hold for one or more days as may be necessary, examinations for the purpose of correcting Enrollment Lists. Ample notice must be previously given of the holding of these Examinations, and all citizens will be called upon to aid the officers in the discharge of their duty by giving all information bearing upon this important subject. Let it be distinctly understood by the people that their only surety of a fair proportion of the burdens of the draft, lies in the proper correction of these lists. Every name improperly left upon the list swells disproportionately the quota. It is the duty therefore of every good citizen to bring before the Board, every man who by reason of over age, permanent physical disability, or two years service, shall be entitled to have his name stricken from the list, and also to furnish to the Board satisfactory evidence in case of death, removal, &c., as also the greater number of names of competent men on these lists the less likelihood there is of any particular one being drafted. Every citizen owes it to himself to see that the names of every man in his district who is properly liable to draft shall be on the list. Recommend to the different sub-districts the propriety of appointing Committees to examine into all cases requiring action, and bring the parties concerned or the evidence of their death or removal before the Board. An opportunity is now offered to all sub-districts of correcting completely their Enrollment Lists. It must be done now, and let it be distinctly understood that should another draft be subsequently ordered, no notice whatever will be taken of complaints of Committees that their enrollment lists are erroneous, nor will any suspension of draft or alteration of quotas be granted on that plea. It is the duty of the Board to add to the lists the names of all men who have arrived at the legal age, or who may have moved into the District, and to strike therefrom the names of all not properly enrolled on account of

1st, Alienage;  
 2nd, Non-Residence;  
 3rd, Over age;  
 4th, Permanent Physical Disability, of such a degree as to render the person not a proper subject for enrollment under the Law and Regulations;  
 5th, Having served in the Military or Naval service two years during the present war, and been honorably discharged.

Care must be taken that the requirements of Sec. 75 of the Revised Regulations for the Provost Marshal General's Bureau are fulfilled and extended to enrolled men who furnished substitutes previous to draft in order to prevent the names of men who are legally exempt from draft from being put into the wheel. The person claiming to have his name stricken from the lists on any of the above grounds must present himself in person, or give such legal evidence of his disqualification and inability to attend in person as shall satisfy the Board. The evidence of death, of being now in the military or naval service of the United States, or of removal from the district, can be furnished by third parties. The Board must be satisfied that the removal is permanent and in good faith, but need not wait certificate of Enrollment elsewhere.

 In order to secure the assistance and cooperation of the people in the endeavor to keep the Enrollment Lists continually correct, the Enrolling Boards have been directed to have copies of said lists kept open to the examination of the public at all proper times, and shall give public notice that any person may appear before the Board and have any name stricken off the list, if he can show to the satisfaction of the Board, that the person named is not properly enrolled, or account of

1st, Alienage;  
 2d, Non-residence;  
 3d, Over age;  
 4th, Permanent physical disability, of such a degree as to render the person not a proper subject for enrollment under the law and Regulations;  
 5th, Having served in the military or naval service two years during the present war, and been honorably discharged.

Especially civil officers, clergymen and all prominent citizens are invited to appear at all times before the Board to point out errors in the lists, and give such information in their possession as may aid in the correction and revision thereof. They should understand that it is plainly for the interest of each sub-district to have stricken from the lists all names improperly enrolled, because an excess of names increases the quota called for from such sub-districts; and that it is equally for the interest of each person enrolled in a given sub-district to place upon the lists all persons in the sub-district liable to draft, because the greater number to be drawn from, the less chance that any particular individual will be drawn. It is the personal interest of every enrolled man that the quota in which he is concerned, shall not be made too large, and that his own chances for draft shall not be unjustly increased; both these objects will be attained if all parties will aid in striking out the wrong names and putting in the right ones. Especially is this the interest of those drafted men who, by putting in substitutes themselves liable to draft, have secured exemption which, by the terms of the law, holds good only until the present enlistment is exhausted in their sub-districts. Men who are over 45 years of age, and in consequence excused by law from the performance of duty in the field, owe it to the cause and the country to take a zealous and active part in the correction of the enrollment lists; a military duty of the first importance. The law requires that the quotas shall be assigned in proportion to the enrollment, and the fairness and justice of this mode of determining the amount of military service due from each and every section of the country cannot be doubted if the enrollment is made as nearly perfect as it is practicable to make it. The amount of service due to the nation from every town or county, is thus laid fairly and plainly before the citizens, and it is expected that a higher motive than a selfish interest will prompt all to do their share in perfecting the enrollment, and seeing a just and efficient execution of the laws for raising troops, whenever it becomes necessary to apply them.
