Over seven million dollars worth of cotton has arrived at New York from Savannah, and from advices received at the Custom House nearly double that amount will probably reach that port before the close of next week.

The thaw of the last week and the heavy rains of Wednesday night, has caused a rise of about 13 feet in the river. The ice has disappeared at this point, but there is a large quantity above which prevents rafting.

We have received the first No. of a neat eight page paper called "The National Petroleum Times," to be published every Saturday.

From the annual report of Railroads in the State for 1864, we collect the following facts respecting the Philadelphia and Erie Railroad: Cost of road and equipments, \$16,760,023; length of main road from Sunbury to Erie, 288 miles; total amount of freight during the year, 474,557 tons; rate of charge for passengers, 3 cents per mile; expenditures \$1,028,752; receipts \$1,039,599 92; persons killed, 10-5 employees, 5 others; injured 16--passengers, 9 employees, and 1 other.

New classes of society bring to the surface new classes of literature. As a specimen of this we have received a periodical called "The Pennsylvania Freedmen's Bulletin," having for its motto "The year of Jubilee has come."

A report from the Superintendent of the Common Schools in the State, shows there are 307,789 pupils in the schools exclusive in Philadelphia. Length of school term, ten months; average cost of each pupil, 63 cents per month. The total cost of the system is \$3,381,172, an increase over the year previous of \$87,073.

Record your Deeds.—The attention of parties holding unrecorded Deeds is directed to the provisions of the Act of Assembly, which requires that—

All deeds and conveyances for real estate in this Commonwealth shall be recorded in the office for Recording Deeds in the County where the lands lie, within six months after the execution of such deeds and conveyances, and every such deed and conveyance not so recorded as aforesaid, shall be adjudged FRAUDULENT AND VOID against any subsequent purchaser for a valuable consideration, unless such deeds be recorded before the recording of the deed or conveyance under which such subsequent purchaser or mortgagee shall claim.

We find the following Cameron county item in a Williamsport paper: "The little town of Cameron has been quite excited in consequence of the shooting of one of its inhabitants. It appears that a man who had been at work in Cameron some eight months, and has been orderly and industrious all that time started, with three others, who are well known in the place, to go to Shippen five miles up the Railroad, and were returning in the night. About half-way between Shippen and Cameron there lives a lady whose husband is in the army. She has two small children with her. It appears that the men who were with the stranger, induced him to visit the house, telling him that she was a public person. They had all been drinking and the stranger was intoxicated. Whether they all stopped to see the result of the visit is not known, but it appears that one of them got out of the wagon and was not far off. When the stranger reached the house and made his errand known to the lady, she refused to admit him to the house. He then made an effort to force the door, which she warned him not to do, but he persisted and was the act of entering, when she fired the contents of a heavily loaded gun into his breast, causing death immediately. These are the circumstances as far as learned, but other developments may soon be made.

There is something strange connected with the case. It seems that the man had two or three hundred dollars about his person, which was not to be found when the inquest was held. Whether the men who were with him robbed him before he went to the house, or whether it was lost after he went to the house is not, as yet known, but probably will soon be ascertained.
