known.

We manufacture four styles of Watches.  
The First has the name  
"AMERICAN WATCH CO., Waltham,  
Mass.," engraved on the inside plate.  
The Second has the name  
"APPLETON, TRACY & CO., Waltham,  
Mass.," engraved on the inside plate.  
The Third has the name  
"P. S. BARNETT, Waltham, Mass.," en-  
graved on the inside plate.  
All the above styles have the name Amer-  
ican Watch Co. printed on the dial, and are  
warranted in every respect.  
The Fourth has the name  
"W. ELLERY, Boston, Mass.," engraved  
on the inside plate, and is not named on the  
dial.

All the above described watches are made  
of various sizes, and are sold in gold or silver  
cases, as may be required.  
It is hardly possible for us to accurately  
describe the numerous imitations to which  
we have alluded. They are usually inscribed  
with names so nearly approaching our own  
as to escape the observation of the unaccus-  
tomed buyer. Some are represented as made  
by the "Union Watch Co., of Boston, Mass.,"  
—and such company existing. Some are  
named the "Soldier's Watch," to be sold as  
our Fourth or Wm. Ellery style, usually  
known as the "Soldier's Watch." Others are  
named the "Appleton Watch Co.," others the  
P. S. Barnett, instead of our "P. S. Barn-  
lett." Besides many varieties named in such  
a manner as to convey the idea that they are  
the veritable productions of the American  
Watch Company.  
We also caution the public, and particu-  
larly soldiers, against buying certain articles  
called watches, so freely advertised in illus-  
trated papers as "Army Watches," "Officer's  
Watches," "Magic Time Observers," "Arcana  
Watches," &c., the prices of which are stated
