method of teaching Reading and Geography. A Committee was appointed to arrange a programme for the following day.

Second Days' Session—Institute called to order at the appointed time, 8 o'clock, A.M., and opened by reading the Scriptures and Prayer.

Afternoon Session.—Class-drills in Grammar, Orthography and Spelling, Geography, and Theory of Teaching, conducted by F. M. Johnson, Miss E. Stone, Supt. Clafin and Prof. Stevens.

Evening Session.—Rev. J. C. Stevens delivered a very interesting Lecture on the subject of "Systematic Study."

Third Days' Session.—Institute called to order at the usual time, and opened by reading the Scriptures and Prayer.

Afternoon Session.—Class-drills in Grammar, Orthography, and Theory of Teaching, conducted by Supt. Clafin, Prof. Stevens, and Miss E. Parish.

Evening Session.—The following questions were discussed: Resolved, That the Legislature should adopt a Standard of Text Books throughout the State.

Fourth Days' Session.—Institute called to order by the President, and opened by the usual Chapel exercises by R. T. Clafin.

Afternoon Session.—The afternoon was devoted to the examination of teachers. About fifteen teachers were examined.

Evening Session.—Professor ALLEN, of the Coudersport Academy, was introduced to a full house, and delivered a Lecture on "Symmetrical Culture," which was very highly appreciated by the auditors.

Resolved, That Professor Allen be requested to furnish for publication in the Potter County School Journal and in the Potter Journal, a copy of his Lecture delivered this evening.

Resolved, That the proceedings of this Institute be published in the Potter Journal during the whole time the Institute was in session.
