The Union State Central Committee will meet in the Union League Rooms, Chestnut street, Philadelphia, on Wednesday, May 16, at three o'clock, p. m.

They have a new paper in Tioga county—a representative of the untamed Democracy—the "Herald of the Union." It is neat in appearance and we hope will keep itself in matter. Luck to you in all but your politics.

Our readers will find an interesting item about a new break-out at White's Corners, in Harrison township. We congratulate the people of that section on this addition to their business interests.

They have re-elected Mr. Cornforth in McKean, and Mr. Reed in Lycoming, County Superintendents for the next term.

The McKean Miner appears again, after an absence of three weeks. Rogers says publishing a county paper is a thankless business and those who are displeased with the way he "runs the machine" will please call and settle their accounts and he will guarantee that they will not be troubled again!

EXPLANATION. In your paper of 17th April, is an extract from the N. Y. Observer, requiring some correction. The person who is supported as a township charge in Charleston, Tioga county, was a Free Will Baptist preacher, fifteen years ago, to a small, poor church. Of his own free-will, he quit preaching, and went into the mercantile business ten years ago. He failed in this enterprise, and is now supported by the public. Such is the statement in the N. Y. Examiner. Whether the laws of Pennsylvania, for the poor, are sufficiently humane, whether, under the circumstances, he has any special claim upon those among and with whom he has labored for mutual good—and whether they have afforded him as much aid as their abilities warrant—are questions upon which I venture no opinion or statement.

The School Directors of Cameron Co. met at the Court House, May 1st, to elect a Superintendent of Common Schools. There was a number of names before the Convention, but after several ineffectual ballots, R. Chadwick withdrew in favor of J. E. Johnson who was elected by four majority.

On motion of S. S. Hackett, the salary was fixed at \$200 per annum. It is so enormously large that we imagine the Superintendent is expected to build several one horse academies, after paying his necessary expenses!

We see here an opportunity and feel disposed to make single suggestion. It may possibly be known to some of our readers that Shippin is in Cameron county and not Cameron county in Shippin as many seem to suppose. And it would be no more than just, if persons in other sections of the county should fill some of the county offices. Many of the official positions are necessarily confined to the County-seat; but there are those in which the other townships could and should be represented. We are willing to give Shippin her share; but it seems at least unfair to make a sort of political "whale" of her, to swallow every official Jonah in the county.

A Curiosity. A correspondent at Westfield, writes to the Tioga Agitator, under date of April 23d, as follows: "Having seen many reports of wonders, both in the vegetable and animal kingdoms, I take the liberty to transmit you the following, which I will admit is somewhat tough: Chariton Phillips, of the town of Westfield, has a lamb about two months old. In the extremely cold weather which we had some time since, the lamb unfortunately had both hind legs severely frozen; so bad that both of them rotted entirely off, close to the body. The lamb, as a matter of course, was now in a very sad predicament; but, however, after many fruitless endeavors, it hit upon the following singular mode of locomotion. The lamb raises itself upon its fore-feet, with the body at an angle of about forty-five degrees, and in this novel position it walks and runs, with apparently the greatest ease. It also stands in this position while while feeding; and, strange as it may seem, it will run as fast as any sheep in the flock. The ease and grace with which it poises itself, in its nearly upright position, would do credit to a moutebank."

Great solicitude is felt throughout the nation as to the health of General Lewis Cass, one of the few survivors of the preceding generation of statesmen.
