SECTION 2. When any inhabitant of the county aforesaid, shall have any sheep destroyed by a dog, or dogs, he, or she, may apply to the appraisers, appointed by this act, and they or any two of them, are hereby authorized and required to view and ascertain, the damage sus-tained by the owner of such sheep, destroyed saforcaid, and when they have ascertained the legality of the claim, and the damages so sustained, they, or any two of them, shall certify the same, under their hands, and seals, to the commissioners of the county, who shall draw their warrant on the treasurer of the county for the amount so certified, to be paid out of the fund arising from the tax on dogs; but if there shall not be sufficient money in the treasury, belonging to said fund, then the warrant shall be kept by the person in whose favor it shall have been drawn, and shall be paid out of the first money that shall come into the treasury, belonging to said fund.

Section 3. The persons elected to audit, and settle, the accounts of the supervisors of the highways, in the several townships, and wards in said county, shall be, and are hereby ap-
