Election Proclamation.

PURSUANT to an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act relating to the Elections of this Commonwealth," approved the second day of July, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, I. W. W. BROWN, Sheriff of the county of Potter, Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the county aforesaid, that a General Election will be held in the said county of Potter on the Second Tuesday (Twelfth) of October, 1865, at which time District and County Officers, as follows, are to be elected, to wit:

One person for Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

One person for Member of Congress, for the XVIII Congressional District, comprising the counties of Centre, Clinton, Lycoming, Tioga and Potter.

Two persons for Members of the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, in conjunction with the county of Tioga to represent the counties of Tioga and Potter.

Two persons for Associate Judges of the county of Potter.

One person for Prothonotary of the county of Potter.

One person for Treasurer of the county of Potter.

One person for Register & Recorder of the county of Potter.

One person for Commissioner of the county of Potter.

Two persons for Auditors of the county of Potter.

I also make known and give notice, as in and by the 11th section of the aforesaid act, that every person excepting Justices of the Peace, who hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States or this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise a subordinate officer or agent; who is or shall be engaged under the legislative, judiciary, or executive departments of this State or the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every Member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select and common council of any city, or commission of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising in the same office or appointment of Judge, Inspector, or clerk of any election in this Commonwealth.

Also, that in the fourth section of the Act of Assembly, entitled "An Act relating to the mode of voting at all Elections in the several counties of this Commonwealth," approved April 16, 1865, it is enacted, that the aforesaid 11th section shall not be so construed as to prevent any Military Officer or Foreigner from serving as Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any General or special election in this Commonwealth:

Also, that in the 1st section of an Act of Assembly entitled "An Act Regulating the mode of voting at all Elections in the several counties of this Commonwealth," approved March 30th, 1850, it is enacted, that the qualified voters of two several counties of this Commonwealth at all general, township, borough and special elections, nevertheless, hereafter, authorized and required to vote, by tickets, printed, or written, or partly printed and partly written, severally classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all Judges of Courts voted for, and to be labelled, "judiciary;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all state officers voted for, and be labelled, "state;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all county officers voted for, including offices of senator, members, and members of assembly, if voted for, and members of congress, if voted for, and be labelled, "county;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all township officers voted for, and be labelled, "township;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all borough officers voted for, and be labelled, "borough;" and each class shall be deposited in separate ballot-boxes.

As so, in accordance with the provisions of the 8th section of an act entitled "A further supplement to the Election Laws of this Commonwealth," I publish the following:

Whereas, By the act of the Congress of the United States, entitled "An act to amend the several acts heretofore passed to provide for the enrolling and calling out the national forces, and for other purposes," and approved March 3d, 1863, all persons who have deserted the military or naval service of the United States, and who have not been discharged or relieved from the penalty or disability therein provided, are deemed to have voluntarily relinquished and forfeited their rights of citizenship and their rights to become citizens, and are deprived of exercising any rights of citizens thereof;

And whereas, Persons not citizens of the United States are not, under the constitution and laws of Pennsylvania, qualified electors of this Commonwealth:

Section 1. Be it enacted, etc. That in all elections hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, it shall be unlawful for the judges or inspectors of any such election to receive any ballot or ballots from any person or persons embraced in the provisions and subject to the disability imposed by said act of Congress, approved March 3d, 1863, and it shall be unlawful for any such person to offer to vote, in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, he shall, for each offence, be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than one hundred dollars, and to undergo an imprisonment in the jail of the proper county for not less than sixty days.

Section 2. That if any such judge and inspectors of election, or any of them shall receive or consent to receive any such unlawful ballot or ballots from any such disqualified person, he or they so offending shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, shall for each offense be punished in like manner as provided in the preceding section of this act in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful ballot or ballots.

Section 3. That if any person deprived of citizenship, and disengaged as aforesaid, shall, at any election hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, vote, or tender to the officers thereof, and offer, to vote, a ballot or ballots, any person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, shall for each offense be punished in like manner as provided in the preceding section of this act in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful ballot or ballots.

Section 4. That if any person shall hereafter persuade or advise any person or persons deprived of citizenship and disengaged as aforesaid, to offer any ballot or ballots to the officers of any election hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, such person so offending shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, shall be

punished in like manner as is provided in the second section of this act in the case of officers of such election receiving such unlawful ballot or ballots.

It is further directed that the meeting of the return Judges at the Court House in Coudersport to make out the general returns, shall be the first Friday succeeding the general election, which will be the 12th day of October.

I also here make known and give notice that the place of holding the aforesaid General election in the several townships and boroughs within the county of Potter, are as follows, to wit:

For the township of Abbot, at the Germania Hotel in said township.

For the township of Allegany, at the school house near the place formerly owned by Chester Andrews, in said township.

For the township of Bingham, at the Bingham Centre school house near A. R. Lewis in said township.

For the township of Clara, at the school house near Sam Stevens, in said township.

For the township of Eulalia, at the New Court House in the borough of Coudersport.

For the township of Genesee, at the house formerly occupied by S. S. Rasco, in Ellisburg.

For the township of Harrison, at the house recently occupied by Mr. Bartholomew, in said township.

For the township of Hebron, at the school house No. 5, near Healy Ingram's, in said township.

For the township of Hector, at the Sanderlin school house, in said township.

For the township of Homer, at the school house near Jacob Poets, in said township.

For the township of Jackson, at the house formerly occupied by L. Burse, now M. Chapman, in said township.

For the township of Keating, at the house of Pilny Barr, in said township.

For the township of Pleasant Valley, at the school house No. 2, in said township.

For the township of Pike, at the house of J. M. Kilburn, in said township.

For the township of Roulet, at the school house near George Weimer, in said township.

For the township of Sharon, at the Sharon Centre school house, near John Voorhees, in said township.

For the township of Sweden, at the house of Aseneth Targgart, in said township.

For the township of Stewarton, at the New Norway school house, in said township.

For the township of Summit, at the house formerly occupied by Jonathan Redson, now M. V. Larrabee, in said township.

For the township of Sylvana, at the school house near J. M. Ross, in said township.

For the township of Ulysses, at the house of Asa Bennett, in said township.

For the township of West Branch, at the house of S. M. Coalbin, in said township.

For the township of Wharton, at the house of Stephen Harton, in said township.

For the Borough of Coudersport, at the Court House in said borough.

SEC. 1. Persons who have been deprived of their pensions under Act of March 3, 1865, in consequence of being in the civil service of the United States Government are restored.

SEC. 2. Persons who have lost one hand or one foot, or are so disabled as to render them unable to perform manual labor equivalent to the loss of a hand or a foot, the sum of \$25.

SEC. 3. Those who have lost one hand or one foot, or are so disabled as to render them unable to perform manual labor equivalent to the loss of a hand or a foot, the sum of \$25.

SEC. 4. Persons who have been deprived of their pensions under Act of March 3, 1865, in consequence of being in the civil service of the United States Government are restored.

SEC. 5. Persons are extended to dependent fathers and brothers, as well as to mothers and sisters.

In addition to the above act, to such persons as are embraced by it, Congress, before its close July 25, 1865, passed a bill increasing the pension to widows and orphans, and extending the benefits of the pension laws to the heirs and representatives of certain invalid applicants, to wit:

Sec. 1 of the act of July 25, 1865, provides for pensions to widows of deceased soldiers or sailors having children by such soldiers or sailors, at the rate of two dollars per month for each child of soldier or sailor under the age of sixteen years. To derive benefit from this act it is necessary to make new application, surrenderring the old certificate.

Sec. 3 gives an increase of pensions to those widows now receiving a pension of less than eight dollars per month, except Revolutionary widows.

Applications for Pensions must be made before the Prothonotary.

ALL who have any interest in war claims will find it to their advantage to follow the following Acts of Congress which have recently become law:

Sec. 1 of an act of June 6, 1865, provides for all soldiers or sailors who have lost the sight of both eyes, or both hands, so as to require constant attendance, the sum of \$25.

Sec. 2. To those who have lost both feet, or are totally disabled in the same so as to require constant attendance, the sum of \$20.

Sec. 3. Those who have lost one hand or one foot, or are so disabled as to render them unable to perform manual labor equivalent to the loss of a hand or a foot, the sum of \$15.

Sec. 4. Persons who have been deprived of their pensions under Act of March 3, 1865, in consequence of being in the civil service of the United States Government are restored.

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BOUNTYES.

THE BILL TO EQUALIZE BOUNTIES HAS BECOME A LAW. The following is an analysis of its provisions:

1. \$100 to three years' men who served their time.

2. \$100 to three years' men discharged by reason of wounds received in service.

3. \$100 to the widow, minor children, or parents, in the order named, of any such soldier who died of wounds or disease contracted in service.

4. \$50 to each soldier not included in the foregoing classes who enlisted for two years or more, and discharged after serving two years.

5. \$50 to every soldier enlisted for two years, and discharged by reason of wounds received in the line of duty.

6. \$50 to the widow, &c., as above, of every soldier enlisted for less than two years, who died in service, or of wounds or disease contracted in the army.

No additional bounty is allowed to three years' men who have received, or have heretofore been entitled to receive, more than \$100 annual bounty, and none to two years' men who have received or are entitled to more than \$50. The law only applies to honorable discharged soldiers of the late war, and to none who have sold or transferred their discharges or rights to bounty.
