Sec. 5. Pensions are extended to dependent fathers and brothers, as well as to mothers and

as are embraced by it, Congress, before its close July 25, 1866, passed a bill increasing the pension to widows and orphans, and extending the benefits of the pension laws to the heirs and representatives of certain invalid applicants, to wit: In addition to the above act, to such persons

SEC. 2 of the act of July 25, 1856, provides for pensions to widows of deceased soldiers or sailors having children by such soldiers or sail-ors, at the rate of two collars per month for each child of soldier or sailor under the age of six teen years. To derive benefit from this act iis necessary to make new application, surren-dering the old certificate.

Sec. 3 gives an increase of pensions to those

widows now receiving a pension of less than eight dollars per month, except Revolutionary Applications for Pensions must be made be-fore the Prothonotary.

BOUNTIES.

THE BILL TO EQUALIZE BOUNTIES HAS BECOME A LAW. The following is an analysis of its provisions:

1. \$100 to three years' men who served their

2. \$100 to three years' men discharged by reason of wounds received in service.

3. \$100 to the widow, minor children, or parents, in the order named, of any such soldier who died of wounds or disease contracted in

4. \$50 to each soldier not included in the foregoing classes who cillisted for two years or more, and discharged after serving two years.

5. \$50 to every soldier enisted for two years, and discharged by reason of wounds received in the line of duty.

6. \$50 to the widow, dec. as above of every soldier enlisted for less than two years, who died in service, or of wounds or disease contract-

ed in the army.
No additional bounty is allowed to three years' men who have received, or have hereto-fore been entitled to receive, more than \$100 national bounty, and none to two years' men who have received or are entitled to more than \$50. The law only applies to honorably dis-charged soldiers of the late war, and to none who have sold or transferred their discharges


