Election Proclamation.
PURSUANT to an Act of the General Assembly, entitled "An Act relating to the Elections of this Commonwealth," approved the second day of July, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, I, W. W. BROWN, Sheriff of the county of Potter, Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the county aforesaid, that a General Election will be held in the said county of Potter on the second Tuesday (Ninth) of October, 1866, at which time District and County Officers, as follows, are to be elected, to wit:

One person for Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
One person for Member of Congress, for the XVIII Congressional District, comprising the counties of Centre, Clinton, Lycoming, Tioga and Potter.
Two persons for Members of the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, in conjunction with the county of Tioga to represent the counties of Tioga and Potter.
Two persons for Associate Judges of the county of Potter.
One person for Prothonotary of the county of Potter.
One person for Treasurer of the county of Potter.
One person for Register & Recorder of the county of Potter.
One person for Commissioner of the county of Potter.
Two persons for Auditors of the county of Potter.

I also make known and give notice, as in and by the 13th section of the aforesaid act is directed, that every person excepting Justices of the Peace, who hold any office or appointment or profit or trust under the Government of the United States or this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise a superior in the office or agent, who is or shall be employed under the legislative, judicial, or executive departments of this State or the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every Member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select and common council of any city, or commissioner of any incorporated district by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector or clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, or any that in the fourth section of the Act of Assembly, entitled "An Act relating to elections and for other purposes," approved April 16, 1860, it is enacted that the aforesaid 13th section shall not be so construed as to prevent any Military Officer or Borough Officer from serving as Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any General or special election in this Commonwealth.

Also, that in the 1st section of an Act of Assembly, entitled "An Act Relating to the mode of voting at all Elections in the several counties of this Commonwealth," approved March 30th, 1866, it is enacted: That the qualified voters of the several counties of this Commonwealth, at all general, township, borough and special elections are hereby, hereafter, authorized and required to vote, by tickets, printed, or written, or partly printed and partly written, severally classed as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all Judges of courts voted for, and to be labelled, "Judiciary"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all state officers voted for, and to be labelled, "State"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all county officers voted for, including office of senator, member, and members of assembly, if voted for, and members of congress, if voted for, and to be labelled, "County"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all township officers voted for, and to be labelled, "Township"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all borough officers voted for, and to be labelled, "Borough"; and each class shall be deposited in separate ballot-boxes.

Also, in accordance with the provisions of the 8th section of an act entitled "A further supplement to the Election Laws of this Commonwealth," published the following: Whereas, by the act of the Congress of the United States, entitled "An act to amend the several acts heretofore passed to provide for the enrolling and calling on the national forces, and for other purposes," and approved March 3d, 1865, all persons who have deserted the military or naval service of the United States, and who have not been discharged or relieved from the penalty of disability therein provided, are deemed to be voluntarily relinquished and forfeited their rights of citizenship and their rights to become citizens, and are deprived of exercising any rights of citizens thereof:

And Whereas, Persons not citizens of the United States are not, under the constitution and laws of Pennsylvania, qualified electors of this Commonwealth;

Section 1. Be it enacted, Sec. That in all elections hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, it shall be unlawful for the judges or inspectors of any such election to receive any ballot or ballots from any person or persons embraced in the provisions and subject to the disability imposed by said act of Congress, approved March 3d, 1865, and it shall be unlawful for any such person to offer to vote any ballot or ballots.

Section 2. That if any such judge and inspectors of election, or any of them shall receive or consent to receive any such unlawful ballot or ballots from any such disqualified person, he or they so offending shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, he shall, for each offence, be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than one hundred dollars, and to undergo an imprisonment in the jail of the proper county for not less than sixty days.

Section 3. That if any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, shall at any election hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, vote, or tender to the officers thereof, and offer to vote, a ballot or ballots, any person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, shall for each offence be punished in like manner as provided in the preceding section or this act in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful ballot or ballots.

Section 4. That if any person shall hereafter persuade or advise any person or persons deprived of citizenship and disqualified as aforesaid, to offer any ballot or ballots to the officers of any election hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, such persons so offending shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and

upon conviction thereof in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, shall be punished in like manner as provided in the second section of this act in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful ballot or ballots.

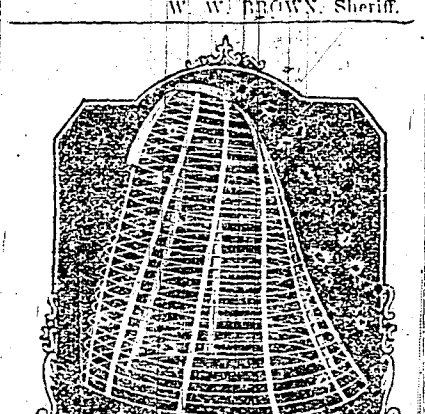
It is further directed that the meeting of the return Judges at the Court House in Coudersport to make out the general returns, shall be the first Friday succeeding the general election, which will be the 12th day of October.

I also here make known and give notice that the place of holding the aforesaid General election in the several townships and boroughs within the county of Potter, are as follows, to wit:

For the township of Abbot, at the Germania Hotel in said township.
For the township of Allegany, at the school house near the place formerly owned by Chester Andrews, in said township.
For the township of Bingham, at the Bingham Centre school house near A. R. Lewis, in said township.
For the township of Clarion, at the school house near Sals Stevens, in said township.
For the township of Keshewa, at the New Court House in the borough of Coudersport.
For the township of Geneva, at the house formerly occupied by S. S. Raso, in Hillsburg.
For the township of Harrison, at the house recently occupied by Ira Bartholomew, in said township.
For the township of Hebron, at the school house No. 5, near Henry Ingraham's, in said township.
For the township of Hector, at the Sunderland school house, in said township.
For the township of Homer, at the school house near Jacob Peck, in said township.
For the township of Jackson, at the house formerly occupied by L. H. Hays, now M. Campbell, in said township.
For the township of Keating, at the house of Flory Harris, in said township.
For the township of O-wayo, at the Centre School House in said township.
For the township of Pleasant Valley, at the school house No. 2, in said township.
For the township of Perry, at the house of J. M. Kittom, in said township.
For the township of Rouse, at the school house near George Weimann, in said township.
For the township of Sharon, at the Sharon Centre school house, near John Voorhees, in said township.
For the township of Sweden, at the house late of Asenath Ziegler, in said township.
For the township of Stearns, at the New Norway school house, in said township.
For the township of Summit, at the house formerly occupied by J. Nathan Nelson, now M. V. Larrabee, in said township.
For the township of Sullivan, at the school house near J. M. Ross, in said township.
For the township of Tuscarora, at the house of Susan Harston, in said township.
For the township of West Branch, at the house of S. M. Coburn, in said township.
For the township of Whitman, at the house of Susan Harston, in said township.
For the borough of Coudersport, at the Court House in said borough.
