—The License Question.—No license. As we announced in our last issue, all of those applications for license to sell liquor against which remonstrances were made were set down by the Court for the 20th of next week.

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granting or refusing license? To what is the discretion of the Court to apply?—To the necessity of a hotel or a license? He thought the latter.

But the act of 1867 settles the whole question for it makes it incumbent upon the Court to refuse a license "whenever in the opinion of the Court, having due regard to the number and character of the petitioners for and against such application, such license is not necessary."

As to the persons petitioning for and against license, Mr. Merrick thought the Court should receive and consider the names of all adults without regard to sex.

It is certain that woman's interests and happiness are as vitally affected by this traffic as any other, and it is equally true that we may think of him who asks to be drunkards of our children—whatever we may feel of loathing or pity for the poor wretch, his victim—we must admit that she who sees her husband and father, property, happiness, and home swallowed up in the vortex of strong drink ought to have some voice in saying whether a right to work this ruin in law is just.

Mr. Elliott spoke very briefly, saying that he had studied the law fully before, and his opinion was well known to the Court. He thought that where a husband petitioned for a license and his wife signed a remonstrance, the wife's signature should not be counted as any weight.

After hearing all that was to be said, the Court announced that they would consider the matter, and make known their decision in the morning. Accordingly, on Tuesday morning the Court said they had decided not to grant any license to sell liquor in Wellsboro during the year.

On Wednesday last the case of an applicant from Westfield was heard by the Court, when previous violations of the law were shown and the license was refused.

There was one applicant from Chatham whom the Court refused to license.
