United States District Attorney of Alabama to his chief. Hon. G. H. Williams, the At-torney General of the United States. It bears date June 25, 1872. It recites the fact that at a session of the court just closed important trials had reached their legitimate conclusion in the conviction of avowed members of the Kuklux organization. Disguised for their deeds of darkness, it seems almost impossible to identify, and convict the guilty participants in crines. But some cases were so established as to secure a verdidt and a penalty.

The first case was a flagrant and painful one. Andrew Jackson and his wife, unof-fending persons, were murdered and burn-ed in and with their house in March last, in the county of Ellmore. The jury failed to convict from the difficulty already stated.

The next case tried was for two raids on white men and several raids on colored men; in which the usual whipping, shooting, school and dwelling house burning counties in 1870 and 1871. The criminals were all members of the Kuklux Klan, so proved by clearest evidence. The political character of the organization was estab-lished, and its purpose to maintain a system of terrorism in the South demonstrated,— the main purpose being to drive out black and white Republicans. A verdict of guilty was obtained in this case, there being no room for doubt. The sentence confines the convicted persons to the Albany penitentiavouth of the criminal

Another case was tried by the same court, and a conviction reached. It was fully admitted during these trials that the Kuklux organization is exactly what has been claimed. The only plea of the defense was, that the guilt of the prisoners was not sufficiently proved. The tes-timony of the colored witnesses was unimpeached, the effort being to impeach the testimony of white men who had been the associates of the murderous Klan. There was no carpet bag testimony. 
