

FALL PLOUGHING.-I often notice articles recommending fall ploughing for heavy soils, and occasionly complaints of it having been tyled with poor success. I always find fall ploughing beneficial when done early enough it the season to rot the sod; but never turn a sol late in the fall intending to plough again in the spring; in fact, for most crops a good cultivating in the spring is better than ploughing, if well ploughed and subsoiled in the fall. I prefer to turn a sod early in August, after mowing or pasturing; herrow and cultivate often, keeping the surface loose and not allowing the sod below to dry; it will then not perfectly by November, when I cross-plough and subsolt, leaving the sur-face rough. In the spring put on h good two horse cultivator and work as deep as possible, and plant or sow at once - Cbr. Germantown Telegraph.

SHEEP AS CULTIVATORS .- It is said if farmers will turn their sheep into their potato patches they will not touch the potato vines at all, but will eat off all the weeds and grass to be found. This is a very important fact, as this practice will not only keep down the weeds and increase the potato crop, but it, will prevent the manuring of weed seed, thus giving the farmer less to contend with the next year. There is a triple profit, the grass and weeds consumed by the sheep cost absolutely nothing, and that which would otherwise be lost is saved, the weeds are kept down when it is impracticable to do so by cultivating, hecause of the size of the otato vines, and the weeds are prevented from seeding.




