



THE NEW SOLDIERS' BOUNTY LAND ACT. -The House of Representatives passed Dec. 12th, 1872, an Act giving to all honorably discharged soldiers who served 90 days or

over in the war of the Rebellion, 160 acres of the Government lands free of cost. It prohibits the soldier disposing of his rights under the Act until he obtains full possess-

ion. Land Office, there remained unsold and unappropriated June 30, 1868, 1,405,868,478 acres of the public domain. Admitting that the soldiers will absorb 820 million acres (an exaggerated estimate), and that 85 millions of acres have been sold, granted to railroads or otherwise disposed of since June 80th 1868, there would still remain to the Governnent about one billion of acres. It is to be hoped that the Senate will promptly pass it as an act of justice. The Government owes its existence to the bravery and heroism of
