It was opened on the 18th of March, 1872, under circumstances which were anything but favorable. I am told that about seventy students registered in the fall term, and many additions have been made this term. The building is alive from early morn till late at night with the sound of piano, organ, brass and stringed instruments of all kinds, as well as the beautiful tones of those who are practicing voice cul-
