POSTAL CARDS.—The following in regard Lwill to postal cards, has been issued for the instruction of postmasters and the public: struction of postmasters and the public:

"Postal cards having written or printed thereon matter of vulgar or indecent character, seurrilous epithets or disloyal devices, will not be forwarded in the mail. Any person depositing postal cards having written or printed thereon, as above forbidden, or causing to be deposited in the post office for mailing or delivery, is subject to a fine of not more than five hundred dollars, or imprison-ment of not more than one year, or both, according to the aggravation of the offense.

"Postmasters are not, under any circum-stances, permitted to redeem or exchange postal cards that may be misdirected, spoiled in printing, or otherwise unfit for use.
