Joseph is thirty years of age (Gen. xli: 46) when he stands before Pharaoh. Consequently in the third famine year, (xlv: 6) when Jacob is one hundred and thirty years old, (xlvii: 9) he is thirty nine or in his fortieth year. Judah, the fourth son of Jacob, was not probably born sooner than the close of the third year after his father's arrival in Padan-Aram. Joseph was born Gen. xxx: 25) fourteen years after this vent.
