Mr. Giddings objected to the second reading, but the reading was carried, the Republicans alone voting against it. Mr. Stevens then offered State for health, fertility of soil, salubrity of climate, we invite those of our brethren who may mittee had first reported. This was lost, the strict Administration men voting for it. Mr. Montgomery then offered the Crittenden bill," slightly altered. This passed by a vote of 120 to 112, every member of the House being present but one, and he was kept away by sickness. The Administration was thus defeated by a majority

of eight. This bill authorizes Kansas to vote on the Lecompton Constitution, and if it shall be adopted. the President is to issue his proclamation, announcing Kansas as a State of the Union. If that Constitution shall be rejected, the Territorial Legislature is authorized to call a Convention to form a Constitution, which is to be submitted' to a popular vote, and if adopted, the President is then to announce the State as admitted. This

turn is given to avoid any further excitement in Congress, on the subject. The bill thus altered, was returned to the Sen-
